Nu Shortcuts in School R 2 Much 4 Teachers

Is the internet becoming the downfall of the English language? Each September Jacqueline Harding prepares a classroom presentation on the common writing mistakes she sees in her students' work. Ms. Harding, an eighth-grade English teacher scribbles the words that have plagued generations of schoolchildren across her whiteboard:

There. Their. They're.
Your. You're.
To. Too. Two.
Its. It's.

This September, she has added a new list: u, r, ur, b4, wuz, cuz, 2.

When she asked her students how many of them used shortcuts like these in their writing, Ms. Harding said, she was not surprised when most of them raised their hands. This, after all, is their online lingua franca: English adapted for the spitfire conversational style of Internet instant messaging.

As more and more teenagers socialize online, middle school and high school teachers like Ms. Harding are seeing a breezy form of Internet English jump from e-mail into schoolwork. To their dismay, teachers say that papers are being written with shortened words, improper capitalization and punctuation, and characters like &, \$ and @.

But teenagers, whose social life can rely as much these days on text communication as the spoken word, say that they use instant-messaging shorthand without thinking about it. They write to one another as much as they write in school, or more.

Almost 60 percent of the online population under age 17 uses instant messaging, according to Nielsen / NetRatings. In addition to cellphone text messaging, Weblogs and e-mail, it has become a popular means of flirting, setting up dates, asking for help with homework and keeping in contact with distant friends. The abbreviations are a natural outgrowth of this rapid-fire style of communication.

Some teachers see the creeping abbreviations as part of a continuing assault of technology on formal written English. Others take it more lightly, saying that it is just part of the larger arc of language evolution. "There is no official English language," said Jesse Sheidlower, the North American editor of the Oxford English Dictionary. "Language is spread not because not anyone dictates any one thing to happen. The decisions are made by the language and the people who use the language."

Others say that the instant-messaging style might simply be a fad, something that students will grow out of. Or they see it as an opportunity to teach students about the evolution of language. Some teachers encourage students to use messaging shorthand to spark their thinking processes. Some teachers feel that when students are writing first drafts, spelling is not a concern, as long as they are writing. If this lingo gets their thoughts and ideas onto paper quicker, the more power to them. But during editing and revising, students should switch to standard English.

January's guest speaker was Theresa Roy from Oakwood Hospital/Arbor Hospice & Home Care. Theresa presented a program called "My Voice, My Choice." This program explains the workings of advance directive, which is a method for people to communicate their health care choices **before** a medical emergency occurs. This is not the same as a Living Will. Theresa shared examples about when a loved one is seriously ill, that person's health care choices may not be known among friends and relatives. As a result, family arguments can ensue and the patient's wishes aren't always kept in mind. Some members shared personal experiences about the patient advocate designation. Theresa gave us folders with easy to follow steps to help us complete an advance directive. She also presented information regarding Patient Advocate Designation for healthcare. An attorney is not needed to fill out the forms, there is no cost and it is recognized by courts and hospitals. Theresa explained that people of all ages should sit down and complete an advance directive.
