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

Book Talk



One of my purchases at the Gamma Alpha book sale was *Water for Elephants* by Sara Gruen. It opens with a day of disaster at the circus and Jacob Jankowski admitting he kept a secret from that day for over 70 years. The novel then moves to the ninety-something year old Jacob in a nursing home. As the older Jacob fights to survive the indignities of old age, he recounts the story of his life with the *Benzini Brothers Most Spectacular Show on Earth*.

Water for Elephants moves between the story of the traveling circus in 1930 to the story of the older Jacob's fight to maintain sanity. While most of *Water for Elephants* is about the circus, the chapters about the older Jacob provide a depth to the story that makes the whole book

richer and more real.

I discovered that Gruen researched circuses and animal behavior extensively before writing *Water for Elephants*. Her writing is descriptive, easy-to-read and I felt as if I were part of the circus community. All of your senses are engaged, from the whistle of the train to the burn of moonshine against the back of the throat. You can almost smell the sawdust and the animals

I loved and hated many of the characters as well. As the adventure and details of Jacob's secret unfolds, it is impossible not to become attached to Jacob, Walter, Bobo, Rosie, and Marlena.

I highly recommend *Water for Elephants*.

"One Crayon Project" is a presentation by Melissa McDermid, a Farmington Teacher and Delta Kappa Gamma member. Melissa won the National Milken Educator Award (\$25,000) and decided to use the money traveling to Tanzania, volunteering in a school, and helping the community of Arusha, Tanzania

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Below is an excerpt from her blog about the One Crayon Project...

"I've really been pondering how to respond to my trip to Tanzania. How does an individual give back to a community that welcomed me into their lives? I know that I must find an appropriate way to respond and keep giving! I've been thinking about different avenues to take and would love to include others on the journey! My current thinking is to have a night to share my experiences with everyone. I just have to figure out when, where, and how to share my experience. Everyone has been great at offering to help... so my current issue is what is the best way to help, how to do it and how to make the effort sustainable. The One Crayon Project... how does that sound. One Pencil, One Crayon, One HUGE Group of Individuals Making a Difference! The name comes from the idea that the nursery (kindergarten) children have the choice of ONE CRAYON to color with. I don't think I'll forget watching children pick ONE CRAYON. That gave that gave me a moment of pause... my students have the choice of 96 crayons, colored pencils, or even smelly markers. Yet these children pick ONE CRAYON and are satisfied. Hence... The One Crayon Project!" **Come to our January meeting and learn about Arusha, Tanzania and be inspired!**

Keeping Teachers from Dropping Out

It's one thing to train and hire teachers. It's another thing to "retain" them. Many first year teachers are assigned to the toughest situations, plunged into the classroom. The door shuts behind them, and there is no one on hand to help. Consequently, many new teachers leave. The turnover costs to school districts is high. The costs in teacher morale are even higher.

To keep new teachers on the job, let's give them what only luck is providing now. Instead of sending new teachers to Siberia, let's send them to Florida. Let's provide a satisfying first year that provides a cushion of success. After that, these teachers will be able to face more difficult situations. And, they will be more likely to stay on the job.

Administrators know well in advance about the better assignments, even in the toughest schools. Now these are saved for those who have been teaching a long time. But if we want to retain new teachers they need to experience success early on. I'm told by those wise in the ways of the schools that this idea for placing new teachers in "good" classes has about much chance as the idea that we should put our best teachers in the hardest-to-teach classrooms. These nay-sayers may be right. But something has to be done. To be sure, we don't have high achieving, motivated students for every teacher to start with. Yet, there are softer and harder situations every school. Let's give new teachers softer situations. Is this really such a radical idea?

Kitchen Talk

Curried Cranberries

Ingredients:

1 cup sugar
1/2 cup cider vinegar
1/2 cup port wine
3/4 cup orange marmalade
1/3 cup of raisins
2 teaspoons cinnamon
1 1/2 teaspoon curry powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 12 ounce bag of fresh cranberries

Procedure:

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Combine all ingredients except the cranberries.

Mix well.

Then add the washed cranberries and mix well.

Spray a 2 quart baking dish with cooking spray.

Pour in the cranberry mixture.

Cover with foil.


Bake for 50 to 60 minutes-until cranberries are soft.

Before serving, let sit for 15 minutes to slightly thicken.

You can substitute chopped dates for the raisins, if desired.

This make a nice accompaniment for your turkey and dressing.



Dropouts: One is Too Many



You read about new teachers dropping out of the professional. Here is a study about high school dropouts.

The “Dropouts: One is Too Many” coalition set out to jump start community conversations about the problems stemming from the approximately 21,000 students who drop out of school in Michigan every year. About 1,600 pages of testimony was collected from more than 500 people who attended the 11 hearings held across the state or shared ideas online. Four key themes were identified as areas that need attention in all efforts to keep students in school until graduation:

- Students need caring relationships.
- One size doesn’t fit all students.
- Tackle the problem early – high school is too late.
- This isn’t just a “school” problem – community collaboration is critical.
