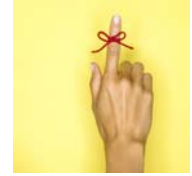

7. **Inform members of important issues** (*Invite legislators for a panel discussion; report on world developments and future innovations; email information updates to members; review opportunities through Delta Kappa Gamma.*)

DKG Minutes for March 25, 2010

About fifteen members from Gamma Gamma Chapter joined us at the Livonia Civic Library for a presentation by Mu Chapter about Teen Dating Abuse. The prevalence of teen dating abuse is staggering. We learned that in the past five years the incidence of abuse in teen relationships has increased from one in five to one in three. Using a Ruth Mott grant, Mu Chapter purchased the copyrights from Deana's Educational Theater for the *Yellow Dress* program, a drama followed by discussion. Mu Chapter used this vehicle to promote awareness of teen dating abuse among the Genesee County teens. Cheryl Cyran, our presenter, was very passionate about this chapter project. Although the meeting was about how their project worked, Cheryl gave us folders that included the following information :

- Early warning signs of teen dating violence
- Safety planning and a safety wheel for teens in abusive dating relationships
- How to help a student or a friend
- Why it is so hard to leave
- Website information and suggested reading lists about dating violence

Mothers

Worldwide, the education level of the parents, particularly mothers, influences the probability that children will attend school. The likelihood of children staying in school increases with the years of education that their parents attain.

In developing countries in Africa, Asia, and Latin America, the education of mothers - even at low levels - is associated with reductions in child mortality. Mothers' schooling is associated with the greater likelihood of prenatal care, childbirth assistance from trained health care providers, and postnatal provision of childhood vaccinations and medical care.

Children whose mothers read aloud to them are more likely to develop the skills and knowledge that influence written and oral language abilities.

Mothers who participate in activities with their children, convey expectations for school performance, and are present when their children wake up in the morning, arrive from school, or go to sleep reduce the likelihood of their children's involvement in violent behaviors such as fighting, carrying a weapon, stealing, bullying, and homicide.

Mothers whose daughters view them as positive role models influence their daughters' confidence. Daughters who aspire to emulate their mothers develop stronger self-esteem and a more positive body image than girls who don't identify with their moms.

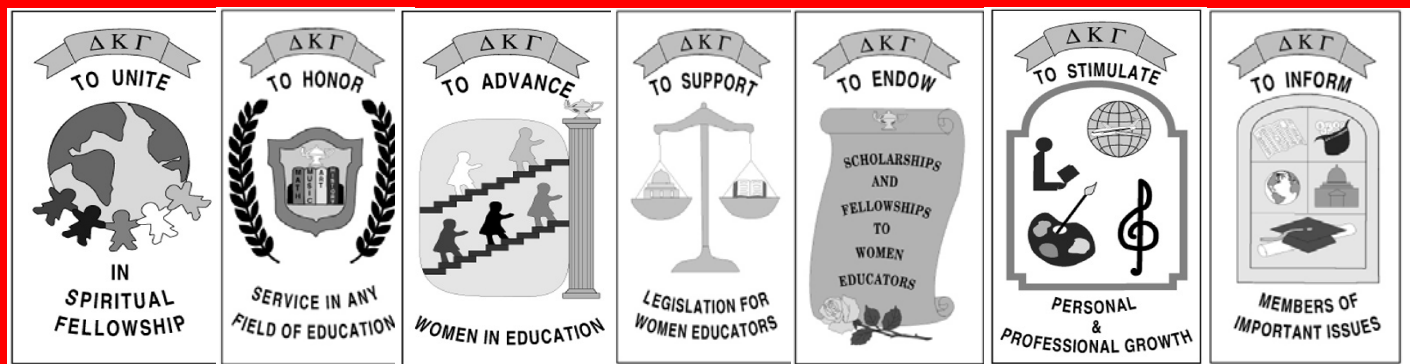

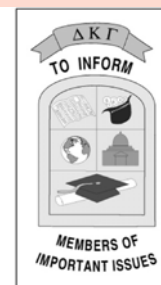

Improving Your Memory
