RECIPE OF THE MONTH

POTATO CHOWDER

Winter is a great time for getting the crock pot out of the cupboard. This savory potato soup recipe with cream cheese and bacon make it so rich. It's easy to assemble in the morning and you can leave it to simmer on its own all day.

INGREDIENTS

- 8 cups diced potatoes
- 3 cans (14-1/2 ounces each) chicken broth
- 1 can (10-3/4 ounces) condensed cream of chicken soup, undiluted
- 1/3 cup chopped onion
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 package (8 ounces) cream cheese, cubed
- 1/2 pound sliced bacon, cooked and crumbled, optional
- Minced chives, optional

DIRECTIONS

- In a 5-qt. slow cooker, combine the first five ingredients.
- Cover and cook on low for 8-10 hours or until potatoes are tender.
- Add cream cheese; stir until blended. Garnish with bacon and chives if desired.



Churchill Teacher in Line to Win Grammy Award

What do Drake, Cardi B and 18 year veteran Livonia Churchill instrumental music teacher Elizabeth Hering have in common? They're all in the running to win a 2019 Grammy Award — a distinction not even Taylor Swift can claim. Nominated along with 2,800 other music teachers for the 2019 Music Educator Award, an annual honor sponsored by the Recording Academy and Grammy Museum, Hering has defied the odds and reached the final 10. The Canton resident received the good news on December 6, but she had to keep it a secret until the complete list of Grammy nominees was released December 11.

"I was in my classroom early (Dec. 6) when my cellphone rang and the caller I.D. said the call was from Santa Monica, California.," Hering said. "I don't get good reception in the school, so I let it go to voice mail." Unfortunately, Hering's voice mail was full. "When I Googled the number, it showed the call was from the National Recording Studio," she said. "So, I went out to my car — it was about 20 degrees, so I froze — and called them back. When they told me I was a finalist for the award, I was pretty stunned."

To say Hering is just a teacher would be comparable to calling a spectacular rainbow singular in color. She also is the team leader for the Livonia Public Schools district music department, lead instructor for the Churchill marching band and is president of the Michigan School Band Orchestra Association.

What does Hering enjoy best?

"Everything," she said with a chuckle. "Everyday, I have the opportunity to do something I love. I never look at the clock. I'm always busy and I love working with the kids."

Hering has already won \$1,000 for herself and an additional \$1,000 for the LPS music program. If she ends up winning the final award, she'll be invited to Los Angeles for the nationally-televised show.

P.S. Mrs. Hering was Rachel and Hannah Smart's band teacher. Both enjoyed and respected her.

CARING FROM AFAR

Caring for others is a concept that starts early in Northville, and one nice example of that is the Kids 4 Afghan Kids organization, which was started 20 years ago – in 1998 – by then-sixth graders who wanted to make a difference for the kids in Afghanistan.

But how did the country of Afghanistan and the struggles that children there face – especially girls – appear on the radar of elementary-aged children in Northville, Michigan? It happened because of a Northville teacher and her connection to an Afghan diplomat.

Khris Nedam – now a principal in the Warren Consolidated School District – worked as a teacher and at an eye hospital in Afghanistan, later helping via the Afghan Embassy in Washington D.C. to broker peace talks between the civil war factions. (They did not succeed.) At one point, she was even on the Taliban's hit list. Through her connection with the embassy, Nedam met Mr. Wardak, a diplomat, who helped her and her husband escape from the country and return to the U.S. Sometime later, when Nedam was teaching sixth grade at Meads Mill Middle School, Mr. Wardak came to speak to her class. His story inspired the students, who decided to establish the Kids 4 Afghan Kids effort.

Two years later, Nedam moved to teaching third grade at Amerman Elementary. The Meads Mill kids carried the torch. What's most amazing about this is the fact that a lot of the original students who started this initiative are still involved. Many are in college, some are married and some have started families of their own, but they all make time and do whatever it takes to keep the kids in Afghanistan in people's minds, and to make people aware of how much more still needs to be done.

Sadly, Mr. Wardak died in a car accident five years ago, but his younger brother has taken over the cause and is now very important to the rural Afghan village that Kids 4 Afghan Kids provides for. Through tireless letter writing, PowerPoint presentations to multiple groups, and good old-fashioned word of mouth, Kids 4 Afghan Kids has consistently raised between \$70,000 and \$100,000 a year, depending on the economy. It's gotten grants from churches and has received educational grants, and it's made the most of these generous gifts.

In Afghanistan, the group has built a one-room schoolhouse, which had 600 students the first year. Now, it has 2,400 active students, and 2,500 are on the waiting list. The number of those waiting to participate has been a surprise to Nedam. "We didn't realize just how many students there are out there," she said. "Some walk four hours each way to school. There is no other education that's available to them."

Along with the school building, the organization has also facilitated the construction of primary and secondary schools – one each for boys and girls – a boys' orphanage, and a health clinic, whose deep-water well provides water for the whole village of 500 people. But Nedam is not satisfied and neither are the local doctors, who want to build a hospital – with beds – next to the current property.

As of now, they are out of space on the current property and own a second property six hours north. "We want to build a ways away for safety," Nedam said. Currently, the land is split between the boys and girls. The custom is to keep boys and girls separate. Fifty boys live in the orphanage, while around 30 girls live in the high school. Nedam would like to construct an orphanage for the girls, but the past use of those facilities as brothels makes gathering support for the effort challenging.

For now Nedam – along with the students in Northville and her former students – are busy with the task at hand, which is to raise enough money to bring electricity and running water to all the buildings on their campus. They’ve been able to outfit the clinic with solar panels and they have a water reservoir swimming pool. The reservoir has pipes running to the school and the clinic, which works by gravity. The pipes are shut off once it gets cold so they won’t freeze. Although her career has taken her to Warren, Nedam has not forgotten those first students in Northville or the community that rallied behind them. “We appreciate their (the Northville community) support, and businesses and families have supported us since the very beginning,” Nedam said.

Even times of extreme hardship didn’t shake the determination of Nedam or the others to help. “When 9/11 happened, the villagers thought we’d pull out,” she said. “But we’re still here. It’s just a real solid partnership, and Mr. Wardak (the second), the tribal leader, is still helping us.”

So, if you’re looking for something different to give to this holiday season, or you’re a tried-and-true supporter of Kids 4 Afghan Kids, they’re always looking to send money for shoes. And if fundraising is your gift, they always need volunteers to help with that, too.

SCHOOL AID TAX SHIFT PASSES IN LATE NIGHT SESSION

Just prior to 2 a.m., the State House barely passed HB 4991, a bill which was used to move a Lame Duck raid of School Aid Fund tax revenue in favor of increased funding for road and environmental projects. The Senate concurred in the amended bill, and both chambers acted early this morning on a supplemental appropriations bill to spend this and other surplus revenue before the new Whitmer administration can propose a new budget.

The bill reduces the amount of income tax earmarked for the School Aid Fund to offset increased revenue from the online sales tax that goes directly to the SAF. Similar to the shell game where Lottery revenue goes to schools only to allow other revenue to flow elsewhere, this measure would reduce the revenue in the SAF available to fund K-12 schools.

This is NOT a cut to current per pupil funding – the additional funding from the online sales tax had not been appropriated yet and is not part of this year’s budgeted state school aid payments. However, it IS money that should have gone into the School Aid Fund to allow for increases in coming years.

The bill includes an amendment that would “hold harmless” the current overall level of school funding if revenues fall below projections. However, in a textbook example of late night Lame Duck legislating, a proposed three-year sunset on the legislation morphed into a sunset on the hold harmless language – not the tax shift.

In the end, the lost revenue could have translated to per pupil increases of \$95 in 2018-19, \$117 in 2019-20 and \$120 in 2020-21. While those amounts would not have closed the nearly \$2,000 shortfall in per pupil funding, this legislation yet again prioritizes funding other projects over the education of Michigan’s children. We will be hard at work with the incoming Whitmer administration to address our broken school funding system and ensure our students get the adequate funding they deserve.

Thanks to all the MEA members who contacted lawmakers to oppose this tax shift, which passed in the House with the bare majority of votes needed. The pressure from back home made this a difficult vote for legislators to take. It prompted strong remarks from opponents.
