DKG INTERNATIONAL NEWS

New Collegiate Membership Category Created

At the International Convention in Austin the membership voted to create this new category. The guidelines define which college students are eligible for membership.

- Undergraduate collegiate members shall be enrolled in an institution offering an education degree and have the intent to continue academically and professionally in the field of education.
- Undergraduate collegiate members shall be in the last two years of their undergraduate degree.
- Graduate students who wish to become collegiate members of DKG must have graduate standing in an institution offering an education degree and have the intent to continue academically and professionally in the field of education.

A collegiate member will pay dues of \$20 (US) and \$11 (US State Dues) per year until she starts her career as a paid educator. At that time, she will pay active member dues and become an active member. If a collegiate member does not pursue a career in education, her membership will expire upon graduation.

Collegiate members may participate in all activities of the Society with the exception of holding office, although a collegiate member could serve as a parliamentarian since that position is not an elected office.



Have You Heard of Meet Up and Eat Up?

The Michigan Department of Education (MDE) has a request for its community partners: step up and speak up about *Meet Up and Eat Up*!

Officially known as the Summer Food Service Program (SFSP), *Meet Up and Eat Up* provides free nutritious meals to children up to age 18 and living in low-income areas, where 50 percent or more of the students qualify for free or reduced-price school meals.

After school lunchrooms close for summer break, SFSP helps prevent more than 500,000 Michigan children from going hungry each year. Filling the summer hunger gap is vitally important because it can reduce summer learning loss, also known as summer slide, for children.

So, MDE is asking education stakeholders to spread the word about the program to the far corners of the state in the hope that more hungry kids will be fed.

"Childhood hunger exists in almost every Michigan community and the need for healthy meals continues during summer break," Interim State Superintendent Sheila Alles said. "The Summer Food Service Program helps provide children with nourishment to make summer fun and foster continued learning."

How can communities make a difference? Take action!

Highlight the Meet Up and Eat Up program in your community. Use social media and other

creative methods.

The program's 337 sponsors statewide can help by offering meeting space; scouting the best site locations; providing activities and learning opportunities; marketing the program and its logo, and contributing to program costs.

"Aligning with Michigan's plan to become a Top 10 education state in 10 years, feeding the whole child the whole year is key to reducing the impact of high-risk factors," Alles said. "Providing equal resources to meet the needs of all children ensures access to quality educational opportunities.

"Many families across Michigan struggle with food security, and there is no reason that children should go hungry when programs like this are available. I strongly encourage schools, businesses, churches, and community organizations to support this effort."

Meet Up and East Up operates in nearly 1,850 schools, public housing centers, playgrounds, parks, and faith-based facilities statewide. Last year, it served more than 3.4 million meals in Michigan.

Top Michigan Educator to Join 'Teach-in'

The commitment that MEA member Rick Joseph made when he became an educator does not stop when he exits his Birmingham classroom each day. This month, it will take him to Texas.

The 2015-16 Michigan Teacher of the Year joined other top educators from across the nation at a teach-in on Feb. 17 in El Paso, Texas to protest the U.S. government's prolonged confinement of thousands of migrant children in crowded juvenile detention facilities.

"As a teacher who is a mandated reporter, I recoil at the thought that we're warehousing children in situations that put them in harm's way," Joseph said. "As educators if we observe child abuse, if we observe child neglect, we are mandated by law to report it.

I am sure many of you heard Rick's passionate speech when he accepted the Michigan Teacher of the Year award in Kalamazoo.

Education Trends in 2019

Education is seeing significant change thanks to advancements in technology. Already, we have seen digital create shifts in how we approach student success, and the future will be no different. In fact, education trends in 2019 are likely going to move faster than they have these past 12 months, and technology shows no signs of slowing down.

This is a good thing because digital transformation helps equip the children of today for the future we are predicting tomorrow. These predictions help us understand how to approach engagement in the class-room and will redefine teaching and education as a whole. They include:

- Augmented Reality (A R): Already, we are seeing an increase in adoption of Augmented and Virtual realities. Initially, a field trip item or a piece of entertainment, teachers and schools are beginning to harness the power of augmented and virtual reality to deliver experiences for their students. These include 'visits' to historical places, the ability to mind-map complex tasks, and an opportunity to keep students engaged and excited about learning.
- Artificial Intelligence (AI): AI has been seen as something quite sinister in the past, but the truth is that AI presents huge opportunities in education. Artificial Intelligence can help schools understand students and allow them to move forward with educational success based on reliable and insightful data. This could also shape how we approach standardized testing, and indeed, how we monitor success within schools as a whole.
- **Security:** Physical security will always be a concern for schools, but thanks to advancements in technology, digital security is a big issue too. The more common digital devices become, the more educators must focus on protecting their students across digital environments and indeed, protecting their own digital assets.
- The Internet of Things (IoT): IoT is saturating a digital market, and is becoming a part of day to day life. School is no different. IoT allows students and teachers to share and engage in real time, both with each other and with content and beyond the classroom. The Internet of Things can also be used to improve campus life, helping schools enhance physical security, make themselves more energy efficient, and be alerted of potential issues with their digital environments.
- Cost Management: Digital advancements, especially those into the cloud, offer the opportunity for schools to streamline not only how they store and engage with data but how they manage the cost of their technology as well. The Cloud and IoT are helping shape educational institutions by providing a means to not only improve their technology but doing so in such a way that it saves them money, as well as time, spend servicing and keeping old hardware up to date.

One of the most significant advancements we will see emerge in the future is *personalized learning*. Digital technologies have given teachers a way to monitor student progress in new and individualized ways, allowing them to keep track of how students are progressing and where they are excelling. The result is an opportunity to tailor learning to the student, allowing them to thrive and utilize methods of learning that enhance their success rather than fall behind.

There are a significant number of digital transformations on the horizon, and education is reaping the benefits of a modern world. Technology is no longer relegated to specific groups and has become more accessible and more user-friendly than ever before. There are challenges ahead, but also great opportunities for growth and success.

A Fireproof Home for the Bride by Amy Scheibe




I discovered this book while on vacation. It is a quick, but interesting read.

Emmaline Nelson and her sister Birdie grow up in the hard, cold rural Lutheran world of strict parents, strict milking times, and strict morals. Marriage is preordained, the groom practically predestined. Though it's 1958, southern Minnesota did not see changing roles for women on the horizon. Caught in a time bubble between a world war and the ferment of the 1960's, Emmy doesn't see that she has any say in her life, any choices at all.

When Emmy's fiancé shows his true colors and forces himself on her, she finds the courage to act-falling instead for a forbidden Catholic boy, a boy whose family seems warm and encouraging after the severe Nelson farm life.

Emmy not only moves to town and breaks free from her engagement, but she gets a job on the local newspaper and this begins to open Emmy's eyes. She discovers that the KKK is not only active in the Midwest but that her family is involved, and her sense of the firm rules she grew up under—and their effect—changes completely.

This book has details that will drop you back into its setting, like sitting in the home economics class listening to a lecture on cuts of meat or group dates to the diner. It is also a love story - the wrong love giving way to the right.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Shrimp Ceviche Jackie Smart

Since I have been doing some Caribbean traveling, I thought I would include this recipe for ceviche. Traditional ceviche recipes consists of raw seafood tossed with an acidic marinade. In this shrimp ceviche recipe, you cook the shrimp before marinating it in lemon, lime and orange juices, plus chiles for some heat. Serve ceviche with tostones (fried plantain chips) or tortilla chips.

Ingredients:

- 2 quarts water
- ½ cup kosher salt
- 1 pound raw shrimp (21-25 per pound), peeled and deveined
- Juice of 2 lemons
- Juice of 2 limes
- Juice of 2 oranges
- 1 cup diced seeded peeled cucumber (½-inch dice)
- ½ cup finely chopped red onion
- 2 serrano chiles, seeded and finely chopped
- 1 cup diced seeded tomato
- 1 avocado, chopped into ½-inch pieces
- 1 tablespoon roughly chopped cilantro leaves, plus more leaves for garnish
- ½ cup extra-virgin olive oil
- ½ teaspoon kosher salt

Procedure:

- 1. Combine water and ¼ cup salt in a large saucepan; bring to a boil over high heat.
- 2. Add shrimp and immediately turn off the heat. Let the shrimp sit until just cooked through, about 3 minutes.
- 3. Transfer to a cutting board until cool enough to handle, about 10 minutes.
- 4. Chop the shrimp into ½-inch pieces and place in a medium nonreactive bowl.
- 5. Add lemon, lime and orange juice.
- 6. Stir in cucumber, onion and chiles.
- 7. Refrigerate for 1 hour.
- 8. Stir tomato, avocado, chopped cilantro, oil and ¼ teaspoon salt into the shrimp mixture.
- 9. Let stand at room temperature for 30 minutes before serving.
- 10. Garnish with cilantro leaves, if desired.


- We do not need to vote in new executive board this year. But please be thinking about whether you want to be a part of executive board for 2020-2022. We have many mentors that can help.
