DKG-US FORUM CONNECTION

SMITHSONIAN WOMEN'S HISTORY MUSEUM Angela Bedenbaugh



For twenty years DKG's U.S. Forum has supported efforts to have a women's history museum in Washington, DC. It looks closer to becoming a reality with two bills introduced in Congress on March 28 and 29 of this year which would make a Women's Museum part of the Smithsonian Institution's complex of museums. Both the Senate bill (S.959) and the House bill (H.R.1980) have been referred to committee.

It interesting that the House version was referred to the Committee on Natural Resources. Currently the museum exists only online at:

The site contains "exhibits." These exhibits feature women in sports, women in STEM fields, women in history, and women campaigning for the right to vote to mention a few. In the STEM exhibit we learn that Maria Mitchell was America's first professional female astronomer. On October 1, 1847, at the age of 29, Maria Mitchell discovered a comet, becoming the first American to do so.



Representative Jahana Hayes (D-CT), the 2016 National Teacher of the Year, and Senator Chris Murphy (D-CT), introduced identical resolutions (H. Res. 231/S. Res. 110) saying federal funds should NOT be used to train or arm educators. The resolutions cite research showing that the presence of guns increases the likelihood of gun violence. They also note that the more guns there are, the more likely students are to be physically injured, feel less safe, and suffer from anxiety, fear, and depression. Already vulnerable groups like students of color and students with disabilities are among those most likely to be affected. A March 2018 Gallup poll that found 73% of U.S. teachers do NOT want to carry guns in school.

An Hour of Code

I saw an interesting article on the news. Code.org is a nonprofit dedicated to expanding access to computer science in schools and increasing participation by women and underrepresented minorities. Their vision is that every student in every school has the opportunity to learn computer science, just like biology, chemistry or algebra. Code.org also organizes the annual "Hour of Code" campaign which has engaged 15% of all students in the world. Code.org is supported by generous donors including Amazon, Facebook, Google, the Infosys Foundation, Microsoft, and many more.

The majority of their students are girls or underrepresented minorities. Code.org increases diversity in computer science by reaching students of all backgrounds where they are - at their skill-level, in their schools, and in ways that inspire them to keep learning.



How We Can Help

We can help bring computer science education to all schools by nominating a favorite K-12 teacher for a scholarship to participate in Code.org's professional learning program. Eligible teachers can receive **full scholarships** and all teachers will learn about free resources to support their students. Teachers from all subject areas are welcome and no computer science experience is needed! I encourage you to go to www.code.org read more about nominating a teacher and their efforts.

Amy introduced us to *Rakuten Overdrive*, *Libby*, *and Sora*. These are apps you can download from your app store on your device and borrow and read free ebooks, audiobooks, comics, and magazines from your library using your phone or tablet. It's easy to get started—all you need is a library card! There is usually a two to three week due date and the book disappears from your device, but you can usually check things out again.

Amy told us about *Lynda.com*. Lynda.com is an online learning resource 24/7 featuring video courses taught by industry experts in software, creative, and business skills. This is also free with your library card.

Michigan Electronic Library (MeL) http://mel.org

MeL is Michigan's 24/7 digital library and is one of the oldest online libraries on the Internet. MeL provides statewide access to nearly 40 subscription based eResources, contains vetted Web sites on topics such as business, jobs, legal, health, government, books and literacy, kids, and teens. Other components of the Michigan eLibrary include:

- •MeLCat, a statewide borrowing system over 430 libraries that allows users to place their own interlibrary loan requests if they belong to a participating library
- •Michigana, a portal for discovering primary resources in digital format such as photographs, diaries, maps, and more on Michigan history
- •Michigan Online Resources for Educators (M.O.R.E.), a portal linking to tens of thousands of curricular based resources such as lesson plans, interactives, videos and more that are aligned to the state and national standards.



Project Gutenberg eBooks require no special apps to read, just the regular Web browsers or eBook readers that are included with computers and mobile devices.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

BBQ Rub Roasted Chicken and Potatoes and Carrots

This delicious and easy recipe makes enough to have leftover chicken for another meal. The traditional bbq rub mix is stellar, and you might want to keep some on hand in an airtight container to sprinkle across other dishes, such as pulled pork or a salmon steak. Small red potatoes and baby carrots roast alongside the chicken, so cleanup is easy. Keep dinnertime rustic by taking the baking sheet from the oven to the table, and eating family style.

Ingredients

- 4 teaspoons dark brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon smoked paprika
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/2 teaspoon onion powder
- 5 teaspoons kosher salt, divided
- 2 1/2 teaspoons black pepper, divided
- 2 (4- to 5-lb.) whole chickens
- 3 tablespoons olive oil, divided
- 1 1/2 pounds small red potatoes, halved
- 1 (8 oz.) package baby carrots
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley

How to Make It

Step 1

Preheat oven to 375°F. Stir together first 5 ingredients, 4 teaspoons of the salt, and 2 teaspoons of the pepper. Remove necks and giblets from chickens, and reserve for another use. Pat chickens dry.

Step 2

Sprinkle 1 teaspoon brown sugar mixture inside cavity of each chicken. Rub 1 tablespoon olive oil into skin of each chicken. Sprinkle evenly with remaining brown sugar mixture; rub into skin. Tuck wing tips under.

Step 3

Toss together potatoes, carrots, remaining 1 tablespoon olive oil, remaining 1 teaspoon salt, and remaining 1/2 teaspoon pepper. Spread potato mixture in a single layer in a 17 x 12-inch rimmed baking sheet. Place chickens, breast side up, facing in opposite directions (for even browning), on top of potato mixture.

Step 4

Bake in preheated oven until a meat thermometer inserted in thickest portion of thigh registers 165°F, 1 hour to 1 hour and 15 minutes. Cover and let stand 10 minutes before slicing. Stir parsley into vegetables.

The Goldfinch by Donna Tartt



GOLDFINEH The Goldfinch is a sprawling story centered on 13-year-old Theo Decker, whose world is violently turned upside down when, on a trip to the Metropolitan Museum of Art, a DOWNA TARTT terrorist bomb goes off, killing his mother,

among other bystanders.

After the shocking beginning, the remainder of the novel reads likes Oliver Twist from Charles Dickens' pen. At the behest of a dving old man in the museum, he takes a painting, *The Goldfinch*, a 1654 masterpiece by Carel Fabritius. He is asked to find his friend, Hobart. For the next 14 years, the painting becomes both his burden and the only connection to his lost mother.

Since Theo's father ran off some months ago, he is effectively an orphan. He is taken in by a school friend's wealthy yet emotionally chilly family on Park Avenue. He is still grieving for his mother. Theo finally remembers to track down Hobart. There he finds himself welcomed by Hobie, an eccentric but kindly antiques dealer. Hobie becomes a kind of father figure to Theo.

More Dickens drama ensues when Theo's alcoholic, drug-and-gambling-addict father turns up with a cocaine-snorting girlfriend and whisks him off to live with them in Vegas. Here, Theo meets rascally Russian teenager Boris (could this be the Artful Dodger?) These two latchkey children embark on a friendship which includes lengthily described drink and drugs binges and even the odd youthful dabble in homosexuality. And all this time, Theo still has the painting, which, though hidden away, he likes to know is there "for the depth and solidity it gave things".

Fast-forward eight years, now in his 20s, the high-jinks continue with ever more drug-addled capers, some of them bloody. We are now in the world of art crime and, though there is a mildly guessable twist involving the painting and a heist.

The Goldfinch was the winner (I am not sure why this won) of the Pulitzer Prize for Fiction in 2014. It was an interesting read, but long (754 pages) read.
