

Detroit may have been founded in 1701, by the French explorer and adventurer Antoine Laumet de La Mothe sieur de Cadillac, but it was his wife Marie who decided much of the town's original layout. From the very beginning Detroit has been a dame's town. Home to broads, women, cats, ladies, and Rosies, the Motor City's story is interlaced with the triumphs, adventures, dalliances and deeds of its female inhabitants. Join Metro Council for the Detroit History Tours on a 4 hour bus tour of some "Wild Women of Detroit" and their stories. You'll hear about Madam Cadillac to Motown greats, prostitutes to murderers, cults to saints, and so much more. Our tour guide will share stories about

civil war spies and prohibition smuggling. You'll learn the verdict of the first all-female jury in Michigan and the story of a woman known as "Rocking Chair."

Together we will enjoy a deli tray from Dan and Vi's with chips and a cookie. It promises to be a wonderful day on The Detroit History Tours "Wild Women of Detroit" tour. Because a bit of swearing comes with the history, all public bus tours are a strict 21 years old and older. Alcoholic beverages are NOT allowed on the bus (DARN.) Bottled water is provided at no cost and guests may bring snacks or nonalcoholic beverages on board.

The tour leaves promptly at 10:00 am and returns at 2:30 pm from Millennium Park in Livonia. Millennium Park is located on Middlebelt and I-96. We will park near the service drive in front the Home Depot parking lot. Home Depot is directly behind Costco. There will be a sign. Boarding starts at 10:00 AM. The bus holds 52 passengers and we need 46 attendees to make the trip less costly. DKG members and their guests are welcome (although DKG members will have priority.) 9 Things Teachers Need If We're Going to Save Public Education

Good teachers are leaving. States won't address the reasons why teachers are leaving. Good teachers are being replaced by inexperienced and/or underqualified teachers. And (eventually) our children *will* be taught by these teachers.

This is what teachers need if we want to save public education.

- 1. <u>A living wage and competitive health care</u>. We will no longer have talented teachers if we do not take steps to make teaching an attractive profession. Period.
- 2. <u>Smaller class sizes</u>. In addition to challenges with discipline, behavior, and building relationships, large classes force teachers to deliver less effective instruction.
- 3. <u>Shared accountability with parents and students</u>. We need parents to support us in and out of the classroom by following up with homework, discipline, and in modeling—especially in their conversations at home about school and teachers—that education matters.
- 4. <u>Support and respect from the public</u>. We will only fix the problems in education if people decide to do what's right for education; even if they don't have kids in school, or if they harbor decades long resentments towards school or teachers.
- 5. <u>Lawmakers who treat education as seriously as security</u>. Because in so many ways, education IS security. A country that cannot think is just as dangerous as a country that cannot defend itself.
- 6. <u>For people in education reform to actually *listen* to teachers.</u> Longer recess. More arts education. Play-based learning. All of these are better for kids and their academic and developmental growth. We know this from research. And yet those in positions of power continue to impose limits on them or cut them completely.
- 7. <u>Highly qualified administrators</u>. A school is only as good as its leadership. We have to demand that our administrators have more than two years of experience teaching!
- 8. School facilities that reflect that the people within them actually matter.
- 9. <u>Counselors</u>. Mental health is a topic that's been in the news a lot in the past couple of years, particularly as it relates to school shootings. But very few public schools have enough counselors to meet their students' needs.

We've known that education has been in trouble for years, but the solution is simple: Listen to teachers. Listen to research. Elect people who do so.

October 16, 2017 Meeting

No Business Meeting was held.

Our speaker was a Detroit teacher who was very inspiring. Michael Craig's vision of a horticulture program for special education students began five years ago with a few vegetable seeds in plastic cups inside a classroom.

Today, Mr. Craig and his students at the Drew Transition Center have established The Garden at Drew, a year-round, award-winning program that has spread to 48 outdoor garden beds, hoop houses and an entire school gymnasium where rows of hydroponic growing tables sit on the ground and adorn the walls with greens in the middle of December.

Mr. Craig started the horticulture program at Detroit Public Schools Community District to combat early-onset diabetes and child obesity through healthy food. Over the years, the program has turned into teaching moderately to severely impaired students ages 18 to 26 skills in horticulture that lead to employment opportunities.

"It's just taking a chance on these students and giving them an opportunity," Mr. Craig said.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

This fantastic **Breakfast Bread Pudding** is a fun, all-in-one take on French toast with maple syrup and sausage. Melted ice cream enriches the "custard" base.

INGREDIENTS

- 1 pound bulk breakfast sausage
- 6 large eggs
- 1 pint vanilla or cinnamon ice cream, melted
- 1/2 cup water
- 2 teaspoons thinly sliced sage leaves
- 2 teaspoons kosher salt
- 1 cup pure maple syrup
- 3/4 pound brioche, crusts removed and bread torn into 1-inch pieces (10 cups)
- 1/4 cup heavy cream

Step 1

Preheat oven to 350 degrees

In a large skillet, coo the sausage, breaking it up with a wooden spoon, until it is nicely browned and cooked through. Using a slotted spoon, transfer the sausage to a bowl and let it cool.

Step 2

In a large bowl, beat the eggs with the ice cream, water, sage, salt and 1/2 cup of the maple syrup. Fold in the sausage and brioche. Scrape the mixture into a 9-inch square or 2-quart oval baking dish and let stand for 15 minutes. Bake for 35 minutes or until the top is browned and the center is set.

Step 3

Meanwhile, in a small saucepan, boil the remaining 1/2 cup of maple syrup over moderate heat, stirring, until reduced to 1/4 cup, about 7 minutes. Remove from the heat; whisk in the cream. Serve the bread pudding with the maple cream.

The unbaked bread pudding can be made up to 6 hours ahead and refrigerated. Bring to room temperature before baking.

- Lunch will be on the bus to save time.
- 6. There is a bathroom on the bus.




"Educated"

by Tara Westover

Tara Westover was 17 the first time she set foot in a classroom. Born to survivalists in the mountains of Idaho, she prepared for the end of the world by stockpiling home-canned peaches and sleeping with her "head-for-the-hills bag." In the summer she stewed herbs for her mother, a midwife and healer, and in the winter she salvaged in her father's junkyard.

Her father forbade hospitals, so Tara never saw a doctor or nurse. Gashes and concussions, even burns from explosions, were all treated at home with herbalism. The family was so isolated from mainstream society that there was no one to ensure the children received an education and no one to intervene when one of Tara's older brothers became violent.

Then, lacking any formal education, Tara began to educate herself. Her quest for knowledge transformed her, taking her over oceans and across continents, from Brigham Young to Harvard and Cambridge. Only then would she wonder if she'd traveled too far, if there was still a way home. *Educated* is an account of the struggle for self-invention. It is a tale of fierce family loyalty and of the grief that comes with severing the closest of ties. Ms. Westover has written a universal coming-of-age story that gets to the heart of what an education is and what it offers.
