RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Key Lime Pie

Made with ordinary limes, this "Key lime" pie tastes every bit as authentic as the real deal — plus it's easier to make.

Servings: 8 to 10 Prep Time: 20 Minutes Cook Time: 25 Minutes

Total Time: 45 Minutes, plus at least 3 hours to chill

INGREDIENTS

FOR THE CRUST

- 1-1/2 cups finely crushed graham cracker crumbs, about 12 whole graham crackers
- 1/3 cup packed light brown sugar
- 4 tablespoons unsalted butter, melted

FOR THE FILLING

- Two 14-oz cans sweetened condensed milk
- 1 cup plain Greek yogurt (2% or whole milk)
- 1 tablespoon grated lime zest
- 3/4 cup fresh lime juice

FOR THE TOPPING

- 1 cup cold heavy cream
- 2 tablespoons confectioners' sugar
- 1 teaspoon grated lime zest
- 8 to 10 thin lime slices



INSTRUCTIONS

FOR THE CRUST

- 1. Preheat oven to 375 °F and set an oven rack in the middle position.
- 2. In a medium bowl, combine the graham cracker crumbs, brown sugar, and melted butter; stir with a fork first, and then your hands until the mixture is well combined. Using your fingers and the bottom of a glass or dry measuring cup, press the crumbs firmly into the bottom and up the sides of a 9 x 1.5-inch pie pan. The crust should be about ¼-inch thick. (Tip: do the sides first.)
- 3. Bake for 10 minutes, until just slightly browned. Let the crust cool on a wire rack

FOR THE FILLING

- 1. Lower the oven temperature to 350°F.
- 2. In a large bowl, whisk together the sweetened condensed milk, yogurt, lime zest, and lime juice.
- 3. Pour the thick mixture into the warm graham cracker crust.
- 4. Bake for 15 minutes, until the filling is almost set; it should wobble a bit.
- 5. Let cool at room temperature for 30 minutes, then place in the refrigerator to chill thoroughly, about 3 hours.

FOR THE TOPPING

- 1. In the bowl of an electric mixer, beat the heavy cream until soft peaks form. Add the confectioners' sugar and beat until medium peaks form.
- 2. Top the pie with the whipped cream.
- 3. Decorate with the lime zest and lime slices.
- **4.** Store the pie in the refrigerator until ready to serve.
- **5.** Slice the pie into wedges, wiping your knife clean between slices, and serve cold.

The Graveyard Book

By Neil Gaiman


While in Florida, I listened to a children's book that won the Newberry Award for the most distinguished contribution to children's literature.

The story opens with a pretty terrifying situation: a man has slaughtered a family in the middle of the night, all save a toddler who escapes unnoticed, walking out the front door and away from the mayhem. (Don't worry about the violence. The action isn't described.)

Up the hill trots the toddler, to a graveyard full of ghosts who take him in. The tone shifts elegantly from horror to suspense to domesticity, and by the end of the first chapter Gaiman has established the graveyard as the story's center. Within its reassuringly locked gates, the boy finds a safe and cozy place to grow up. (Gaiman has said that "The Jungle Book" was one of his influences.)

Nobody Owens, known to his friends as Bod, is a perfectly normal boy. Well, he would be perfectly normal if he didn't live in a graveyard, being raised and educated by ghosts, with a solitary guardian who belongs to neither the world of the living nor the world of the dead.

Among the dead are teachers, workers, wealthy prigs, romantics, pragmatists and even a few children - a village ready to raise a living child. And they do, ably led by Silas, an enigmatic character who is not really one of them, being not quite dead and not quite living. In this moonlit place, the boy - who is given the name Nobody Owens, or Bod for short, has adventures, makes friends (not all of them dead), and begins to learn about his past and consider his future.



While "The Graveyard Book" will entertain people of all ages, it's especially a tale for children in grades four and five.

The audio Graveyard Book was beautifully performed by a full cast of English actors. I thoroughly enjoyed listening to this book.
