## October 20, 2022 Meeting Recap

Here's what you missed if you didn't attend the October meeting!

Gamma Alpha had a field trip to Seedlings on October 20. For those who don't know, Seedlings Braille Books for Children is a 501(c)3 non-profit, tax-exempt organization dedicated to increasing the opportunity for literacy and education by providing high quality, free and low cost braille books for children. In 1984 when Debra Bonde founded Seedlings, braille materials were scarce and expensive. Her goals were to increase the availability and lower the cost of braille books for children in order to promote their literacy skills and the love of reading. In 1985, the first year of book production, where learned that Debra made 221 books in her basement office using an old fashioned stylus. Her father, an engineer, made a braille typewriter for Debra. By 1990, Seedlings was producing 5.000 books per year, which precipitated its move out of Debra's basement and into the Bentley Center in Livonia and eventually to their present location on Farmington Road in Livonia. In 2021, with a small staff, and a group of loyal volunteers, Seedlings produced over 35,300 braille books and articles. In 2017, Debra was name Person of the Year by Channel 7 news. We watched a video in which Seedlings was featured in PBS' award winning show, *Under the Radar*. Debra has received other awards from community, church, and schools. She has also received the Distinguished Service Award from DKG Michigan State Organization. After the tour of the facility, the group went to Los Tres Amigos for dinner.

# Tips for Reading to Young, School-Age Children from the Story Ladies and Librarians

Making reading a pleasurable habit is one of the most important things you can do for the child and sets them up for lifelong readership. Here are some tips for reading aloud according to librarians.

## ALL READING IS GOOD READING.

Story time offers a chance to model good reading and thinking strategies. It exposes young learners to a rich variety of literature. When accompanied by supportive and engaging discussions, children are able to extend their world view and develop important critical thinking skills. Choose stories or texts that respond to children's interests and experiences. For very young children or emergent readers, choose books with vivid pictures, a strong story line, engaging characters, and evocative language. Humorous and predictable books are particularly successful.

## Preview the book.

Practice reading the book through so you can decide where to pause for emphasis and where to elicit questions, predictions, or reactions. Twenty minutes is optimal for a session.

## INTRODUCE THE BOOK

Point out the cover, title, and author. Invite the children to predict what the book is about. You can also give a brief explanation of why you chose to read this book.

## WATCH YOUR AUDIENCE.

If they look bored or confused, you may need to change the book.

## READ WITH EXPRESSION.

Let your voice reflect the tone of the story or the personalities of the characters. Don't read too fast. Vary your pace so you can pause for emphasis. Allow time for children to think about what's happening or what might come next.

## EMBRACE WORDLESS PICTURE BOOKS.

Wordless picture books are a great opportunity to think and talk about what is happening—and to predict what will happen next!

## **RECIPES**

## Glazed Bacon 'Cheese-mas' Cob Loaf

Oh Christmas cob, oh Christmas cob! If you want to impress this festive season, look no further, because this bacon and cheese cob loaf is about to change the Christmas appetizer game for good. The maple glaze, the crusty bread, and the ultra-cheesy filling... it's a serious showstopper. FYI, a cob loaf, sometimes called the Bishop's cap, has a distinctive cross cut in the top before baking. Some have suggested it is so named after Queen Victoria's husband, Prince Albert of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha.

#### **INGREDIENTS**

1 TBS olive oil

5 ounces of bacon, finely chopped

1 small brown onion, finely chopped

2 garlic cloves, crushed

1 block of cream cheese, at room temperature, chopped

1/2 cup of sour cream

1/3 cup chopped fresh parsley leaves, save a little for garnish

1 cob loaf of bread (round loaf)

18 bacon strips

1/3 cup maple syrup

Salt and pepper, to taste

Persian cucumber wedges, to serve

Peeled baby carrots, to serve

## **DIRECTIONS**

- 1. Preheat oven to 425. Line a baking tray with parchment paper.
- 2. Heat the olive oil in a frying pan over medium-high heat. Add the cut bacon and onion. Fry the onions and bacon for 4-5 minutes or until the bacon is brown. Add the garlic and cook, stirring, for 30 seconds or until aromatic. Transfer to a heatproof bowl and set aside to cool slightly.
- 3. Add the cream cheese, sour cream, and parsley to the fried bacon/onion/garlic mixture. Season the mixture with salt and pepper to taste. Stir until combined.
- 4. Cut the top off cob loaf, about an inch and a half from the top and reserve. Scoop out bread inside, leaving an inch-thick shell. Cut inside bread into large pieces and the reserved top into wedges.
- 5. Place the cob on prepared tray. Wrap 1 rasher over side of cob, tucking end under to secure. Repeat with remaining rashers, overlapping slightly. Brush with syrup. Bake for 20 minutes.
- 6. Spoon the bacon/cream cheese mixture into loaf. Brush rashers again with syrup. Place chopped bread on tray.
- 7. Reduce oven to 350 degrees. Bake for 20 minutes or until golden. Brush rashers with remaining syrup. Top with extra parsley. Serve with carrots, cucumbers, and bread.






## What Are We Reading?

## Circe By Madeline Miller

I bought this book on the recommendation of Fran Saenz at the September meeting. If you are a mythology fan, and who isn't, it won't disappoint. Circe by Madeline Miller is a feminist retelling of Homer's Odyssey. The novel reveals the Greek goddess's quest for self-discovery and change. She is despised by her family for not being as powerful as her father or alluringly beautiful as her mother. Her father is Helios, the sun gold. Her mother Perse is a beautiful ocean nymph. Helios banishes Circe to the underground halls of the palace to keep her out of sight. She is teased, taunted, and bullied. remember The Odyssey from freshman English, you know Circe is as beautiful as she is dangerous. Zeus is threatened and banishes her to Aeaea, a deserted island. There she hones her occult craft, tames wild beasts, and crosses paths with many of the most famous figures in all of mythology, including Daedalus and his son Icarus, the Minotaur, Jason and the murderous Medea, and, of course, Odvsseus. She was able by means of drugs and incantations to change humans into wolves, lions, and swine. Remember how she changed Odysseus' companions into swine? Circe learns so many lessons from her life. Every incident that happens either at the halls of Helios or the deserted island of Aeaea has left her with a valuable lesson. Her long term suffering leads to the discovery of her rightful place in the world. She subsequently stands up to those who had mistreated her in the past. The tough times she faces since her childhood have left her with ultimate strength and boldness. The ending was satisfying. By the way, you can still enjoy the book if you don't know much about Greek mythology.
