Recipes

Creamy Corn Pasta

With summer comes fresh corn on the cob. Here is a quick recipe you might enjoy.

Ingredients

6 ears fresh corn, shucked
12 oz. orecchiette pasta
1 oz. Romano cheese, finely grated, plus more for serving Kosher salt
2 scallions, chopped

1/2 c. basil, plus more for serving Hot sauce, for serving

Procedure

Step 1

Bring large pot of salted water to a boil. Add corn and cook 2 minutes. Transfer to cutting board.

Step 2

Add orecchiette to same pot and cook per package directions. Reserve 1 cup cooking water, then drain pasta.

Step 3

When corn is cool enough to handle but while pasta is still cooking, cut off kernels (you should have about 3 cups). Transfer 2 cups to blender along with Romano cheese, 3/4 cup pasta cooking water, and 1/4 teaspoon salt; puree until very smooth.

Step 4

Toss pasta with corn puree, adding some reserved pasta water, 1 Tbsp at a time, if pasta seems dry. Fold in reserved corn, scallions, and basil. Serve sprinkled with additional cheese and basil and with hot sauce if desired.

There are secrets and lies in abundance in **The Daughters.** Carys marries Bill after his first wife, Alice, apparently commits suicide. She accepts his two daughters Sara, who is only five years younger than she is, and Lucy as her own. Sara moves

away as soon as she is able.

Lucy was only six when her mother died and subsequently grew up with several mental health issues. Carys finds Lucy after a possible suicide attempt of her own. While out walking the dog, Carys meets someone who specializes in hypnotherapy. Carys thinks this is the perfect solution and gets Lucy an appointment.

Sitting in the waiting room, Carys allows herself to hope this will help Lucy. Then Lucy comes running out of the therapist's room, her eyes wild. She had a memory that leaves her shaking. She sees her father...a woman she doesn't recognize...a knife! Lucy says she saw her father kill someone. Carys is certain that the memory isn't real. Bill wouldn't hurt anyone. But then a body is found buried in overgrown woods near their home. And Lucy says if they keep looking they'll find her mother next.

Carys really wants to help Lucy, but she feels pushed out when Sara returns. She has been living in Australia and worked as a police officer. When Sara discovers that their mother may not have committed suicide, she wants to investigate more.

I liked that the characters each had their own secrets they were trying to keep from the others. The escalation of events and the twists and red herrings towards the end was enjoyable, too.

In Memoriam

The Membership Committee, led by Amy Wright, held a Ceremony of Remembrance for Carol Holland, Grace Morgan, and Debbie Ervin. We mourn their passing because we will miss them; but death is another beginning for our dear friends. They have left a part of themselves with those they loved, with their colleagues, and with all of us. They are missed by all who knew them.

Carol was born in Rochester, New York. She was majoring in Home Economics, but her husband's work had them move to Alabama, then Ohio, before eventually settling in Redford, and finally Livonia. Carol completed her coursework on a part-time basis and earned her BA in Education, as well as her MA from Eastern Michigan University. She completed her 30-year career as a first grade teacher in Livonia Public Schools teaching at Hoover, Buchanan, and finally Tyler. Carol joined Gamma Alpha in 1981.

Barbara Broadley was her sponsor. Carol served as First and Second Vice President, and as Recording Secretary. She was also the World Fellowship Chair. She was Chapter Woman of Distinction in 2000 and 2007! Carol was an avid traveler exploring the US and abroad and would bring a little globe bank to meetings collecting coins from those who forgot to wear their pins to contribute to the World Fellowship Fund. In retirement, Carol volunteered at the Northville Library and performed alongside other seniors in community musical products as part of Beyond Belief Senior Theater, often playing her beloved ukulele. She retained her quick wit and sense of humor until her final days. Carol touched the lives of hundreds of children and made many lifelong friends with her fellow educators.

Grace was a member of Gamma Alpha for 39 years. She was initiated in April 1980. Grace was supposed to be initiated in 1979 as a charter member, but ended up having an emergency with one of her kindergarten students and was unable to attend the initiation. Grace taught kindergarten for Wayne-Westland Community Schools, and retired in 1995. She served as chapter president from 2000 to 2002. In 1987, she was honored as the chapter's Women of Distinction. Grace enjoyed doing crafts, especially

anything to do with card making. Her basement had numerous shelves filled with stampers, colorful stamp pads, glitter, decorative paper punchers, glue, embossers, cri-cut machines, and beautiful paper for her card making groups. It looked similar to scrapbook store! Grace was a regular attendee and presenter at Women in the Arts and the state convention. Grace led card making sessions at Beverly House Girls Group Home. She organized no-sew fleece blanket making for the girls. Grace made arrangements for us to use her church for a few meetings and the baby shower for teen mothers at Sumpter House. Grace loved to travel. She and Carol Holland were frequent travel buddies. One of her favorite trips was visiting Australia with Carol. Grace was a very loving, kind, giving, and helpful person to all. Grace was also a member of the Beyond Belief Senior Theater with her Gamma Alpha friend, Carol.

Deborah Ervin was born in Detroit. Debbie taught in Livonia Public School District for over 30 years. She said that she blessed to be given the opportunity to teach grades K-12 as a Learning Specialist and Teacher Consultant. Debbie was a member of DKG since 1980. Marcia Scarr was her sponsor and friend. She dropped out of the chapter for a few years when life got too hectic, but reinstated in 2007. Debbie chaired many committees over the years: Empathy, Hospitality, History, Nominations, Personal Growth, and World Fellowship. Debbie was the Chapter's inction for 1008. She enjoyed attending State Conventions and Fall

Woman of Distinction for 1998. She enjoyed attending State Conventions and Fall Conferences. Debbie was an avid bridge player. She enjoyed reading and belonged to a book club. She loved to travel. Debbie and her husband, Bob, were able to travel around the U.S. and abroad. Bob was involved with a number of musical groups. Debbie was his 'roadie' and attended gigs and concerts with him. Finally, being a grandparent was one of Debbie's greatest joys.
