Presidents' Message





In 2024, Gamma Alpha will celebrate the forty-fifth anniversary of being chartered as a chapter in DKG. In order to clear out the president's box of materials passed on to incoming presidents each biennium, I have been busy scanning minutes from the 80s to the mid-90s this summer. Gamma Alpha was chartered on April 2, 1979. According to the minutes, on September 8, 1982, President Joan Lyon asked Marcia Wiss-Scarr to present a motion to the Executive Board at the state level that the city and site of the 1983 Delta Kappa Gamma Convention be changed from Grand Rapids and the Amway Convention Center. This was due to the support which Amway gives to organizations which are anti-union, anti E.R.A., anti-reproductive rights, and anti-public education. Discussion also included that Grand Rapids utilized shared-time teaching with parochial schools and was highly identifiable with Amway. This was a gutsy move for a newbie chapter. The question was brought by Joan Lyon and the motion was passed intact unanimously. Important issues should not be ignored. Gamma Alpha Chapter was a new chapter-just three years old. Too new to get involved. Too new to let their wishes be heard. But Marcia Scarr, Sherry Green, Suzanne Bacinski, Barb

Broadley, Esther Loskowske, and Fran Saenz stood up for what was right. I, for one, am proud to be a member of an organization that isn't afraid to voice opinions. I stand with these members.

Underground Railroad Living Museum "Flight to Freedom" is a "storytelling" re-enactment, by members of the church about the original Underground Railroad passage that operated between 1840 and 1863. On the tour visitors will be shackled (with wrist bands) at the entrance of the tour and begin their journey by entering through the "Door of No Return," on Goree Island in Africa. As this journey

begins, visitors transform into passengers on the Underground Railroad and are led to freedom by a conductor. Passengers hide from bounty hunters, cross the Ohio "Deep" River, and take retreat in a safe house in Indiana which is owned by Abolitionist Levi Coffin. Finally, passengers move to "Midnight," the code name for Detroit and take safe haven at the First Congregational Church of Detroit before moving on to Canada and "Freedom." 
What Will Classrooms Look like in 2050?



Classrooms in 2050 will be vastly different from those of today. Here are some of the key features that we can expect to see:

- More technology. Technology will be even more pervasive in classrooms of the future. Students will use tablets, laptops, and other devices to access information, collaborate on projects, and learn in new and innovative ways.
- More personalized learning. Technology will be used to personalize learning for each student. This could include using adaptive learning software that adjusts the difficulty of lessons based on a student's progress, or using virtual tutors that can provide one-on-one instruction.
- More collaboration. Students will collaborate more often in classrooms of the future. They will use technology to work together on projects, share ideas, and learn from each other.
- More focus on soft skills. In addition to academic skills, students will also be taught soft skills such as critical thinking, problem solving, and teamwork. These skills will be essential for success in the workforce.
- More emphasis on experiential learning. Students will learn by doing in classrooms of the future. They will participate in hands-on activities, field trips, and internships to gain (*Continued on page 18*)

Good Night, Mr. Wodehouse **By Faith Sullivan**



Spoiler Alert!!! The prologue of Good Wodehouse Niaht. Mr.begins with the obituary of the main character, Nell Stillman. Nell has lived a seemingly quiet life in Harvester, MN: raising her baby son alone after her husband's sudden death. Faith Sullivan teaching third grade, caring for friends and neighbors,

and reading voraciously. But like so many "ordinary" lives, Nell's story contains hidden depths and rich layers of love, loss and wisdom.

Author Faith Sullivan describes small-town life in Harvester through the eyes of Nell. She is an intelligent, generous narrator who fights off gossip, pettiness, and tragedy with compassion, perseverance, and forgiveness. Not an easy fate for a woman in small-town America at the beginning of the twentieth century.

The rest of the book covers Nell's life from the point of her husband's sudden death until her death many years later. Nell's friends and family members precede her in death as can happen real life - some get sick, some go off to war, and others drop dead without any foreshadowing. But in the works of Austen, Twain, Dickens, Elliot, Chekov, and especially the British novelist P.G. Wodehouse, Nell discovers a "world that provided all that the so-called real world withheld most especially, friends who didn't leave." Nell's enthusiasm for Wodehouse's books evoke a simpler time when reading and friendship could ward off despair. Nell manages to find hope, even love, in every stage of her life, the most satisfying of which is her interaction with her favorite author.

I highly recommend this book.

BRITISH STEAK AND ALE PIE

Tender pieces of steak are cooked with vegetables and Guinness, then wrapped in a flaky buttery crust. Serve it with pea and chips for a perfectly comforting meal.

For the pastry:

3 cups all-purpose flour ¹/₂ teaspoon salt 2 sticks/1 cup unsalted butter, cubed and kept cold until ready to use. You can also use lard. ¹/₂ cup cold water 1 large egg beaten to brush on pastry

For the filling:

2 tablespoons vegetable oil
2 pounds beef round steak cut into 1/2-inch cubes
1 medium onion, chopped finely
2 medium carrots, peeled and cut into bite-size chunks 1 cups
2 garlic cloves, peeled and finely chopped
2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
1 bottle of Guinness
3 cups beef stock (low sodium if possible) * see note
1/2 teaspoon thyme
1/2 teaspoon rosemary
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
1 large egg, beaten

For the filling:

- 1. Add the vegetable oil to a large, heavy, ovenproof saucepan over medium high heat. Flour the beef cubes. Add the beef (don't overcrowd the pan, work in batches) and cook, turning the pieces until brown on all sides, adjust heat as needed if the bits on the bottom are getting too brown. Also add more oil as needed. When all pieces are browned, remove and set aside.
- 2. To the same pan, add the onion and carrots and cook until the onions soften. Add garlic and Worcestershire sauce. Stir to mix well and cook for 1 minute.
- 3. Stir in two tablespoons of flour. Stir for about two minutes. Then add the Guinness, beef stock, thyme, rosemary and salt. Add the meat back to the pan. Stir then cover with a lid. Place in a 325 degree oven for 1½ to 2½ hours (time will depend on the size of the beef pieces.) Remove the lid and cook for 15 more minutes to thicken the gravy if needed. You do not want it too runny; it should be rather thick.

To make the pastry:

- 1. Add the flour, salt and butter to a large bowl. Using your fingertips, rub the butter and flour until it resembles breadcrumbs. Drizzle in the water and mix using a fork until it starts to come together and holds together when pressed in your hand. You may not need all of the water. Remove and shape into a ball on a floured board. Wrap in plastic wrap and refrigerate to chill the butter for 15 -30 minutes
- 2. Preheat oven to 425°F with rack in the center of the oven. Lightly butter a 9 or 10-inch pie dish.

- 3. Remove the dough from the refrigerator and cut in half. Wrap one half back in the plastic wrap and refrigerate. This one is for the top of the steak and ale pie.
- 4. Roll out the half onto a floured surface to a thickness of 1/8 of an inch. Cut a circle from the dough 1/2 inch larger than your pan and place into the pie dish allowing the edge to hang over.
- 5. Blind baking the crust: Cut a piece of parchment paper the size of the center of the pie dish and place dried beans in the center to weigh down the dough. Or you can place a piece of foil on top of the dough and weigh down with an oven-proof dish that will fit inside. Bake for 12 minutes until you start to see the edges get a little golden brown.
- 6. Remove the crust from the oven, grab the corners of the paper or foil and remove the beans or dish weighing the crust down. If it puffs, it should go down.
- 7. Return the crust to the oven for 5 more minutes to cook the pastry. Blind baking the bottom crust prevents it from being soggy.
- 8. Once the crust is out of the oven, take the rest of the dough and roll out onto a floured surface and cut a 10-inch circle. Fill the cooked crust with the beef filling (it shouldn't be too wet.) Reserve some gravy for use when served.
- 9. Brush the edges of the cooked pastry with the egg. Roll the pastry circle over your rolling pin, lift and place on top of the pie with the egg washed edges down so they stick to the other dough, folding the edge of the top dough under the bottom dough and pinch to seal, or press with a fork.
- 10. Brush with the entire top with egg wash and cut a couple of slits in the center of the crust. Bake for 25 minutes until golden brown. The time will vary depending on your oven. Allow to rest for 10 minutes after taking out of the oven before slicing to allow the sauce to thicken. Serve with gravy, mashed potatoes or chips, and peas.

NOTES

Taste your stock, if it is salty, you may need to adjust the amount of salt in the dish

In Memoriam F. Jose Engel November 15, 1929 - June 23, 2023

Diane Frangie, Judi Fisher, and Jackie Smart attended the funeral of Jose Engel to honor our friend, colleague, and Gamma Alpha (formerly Kappa chapter). During her lifetime, she was all our organization represents - a key women educator. She performed her educational tasks with enthusiasm, professionalism and dedication. Whatever she attempted, she carried through responsibly. She searched constantly to enrich the lives of those she taught and with whom she worked.

Jose was born in Orange, New Jersey, on November 15, 1929. She was a smart and caring person and was the Valedictorian of her high school class. She received her BA from the University of Michigan and her MA from Michigan State University. Jose taught at Burton Elementary in Berkley. She changed districts and taught math at Anderson Middle School and Bloomfield East and West Junior high for a total of 37 years. Jose scored and timed girls and boys sporting events (track, basketball, volleyball, and wrestling) for 40 years until she was 90.

We mourn Jose's passing because we will miss her; but death is another beginning for our dear friend. She has left a part of herself with those she loved, with her colleagues, and she will missed by all who knew her.
