Meeting: Underground Railroad Living Museum "Flight to Freedom" is a "storytelling" re-enactment, by members of the church about the original Underground Railroad passage that operated between 1840 and 1863. On the tour visitors will be shackled (with wrist bands) at the entrance of the tour and begin their journey by entering through the "Door of No Return," on Goree Island in Africa. As this journey begins, visitors transform into passengers on the Underground Railroad and are led to freedom by a conductor. Passengers hide from bounty hunters, cross the Ohio "Deep" River, and take retreat in a safe house in Indiana which is owned by Abolitionist Levi Coffin. Finally, passengers move to "Midnight," the code name for Detroit and take safe haven at the First Congregational Church of Detroit before moving on to Canada and "Freedom." Lunch will follow the tour.

When the Nightingale Sings by Suzanne Kelman



If you enjoy historical fiction, this book is your cup of tea. *When the Nightingale Sings,* by Suzanne Kelman, is a powerful and moving novel set during World War II. It tells the story of two remarkable women, Judy Morgan and Hedy Lamarr, who overcame prejudice and adversity to make significant contributions to the war effort.

It is 1937. Judy Morgan meets Hedwig Kiesler at a museum in London. Hedwig is a Jewish woman who has fled her abusive husband and the

Nazis. Hedwig is a Jewish wohan who has hed her abusive husband and the Nazis. Hedwig reinvents herself while she is on a ship to America. She adopts the stage name Hedy Lamarr and quickly becomes a film star. Judy and Hedy appear to be complete opposites, yet their friendship is immediate. Judy completes her degree in physics at Cambridge and then goes to work at the Cavendish Lab. But she is frequently undermined and dismissed by her boss because she is a woman. Hedy seems to have more power and opportunity in Hollywood. However, she is passed over for serious roles and praised for her beauty rather than her intelligence. Neither woman is satisfied with the roles that women are allowed. I felt upset how both women are judged and constrained by the stereotyped gender roles of the historical period. They have extraordinary scientific minds and want to put them to use for the war effort. They have to fight for recognition in a male dominated world.

Hedy Lamarr is not just a glamorous Hollywood star, but also a gifted inventor. She teams up with composer George Antheil to develop a secret communication system that is later used to guide torpedoes. Judy develops a radar countermeasure technique.

The book is written with alternating chapters about each woman to show the developments in their lives, some of which are tragic. Many chapters end with letters and telegrams between the two which give a more personal insight as they are direct and emotional commentaries on the events we have just read about.

Kelman does a masterful job of weaving together the stories of these two remarkable women. Judy's character is loosely based on Welsh physicist Joan Curran who worked on the Enigma machine at Bletchy Park. The characters are complex and relatable. They face difficult challenges with courage and determination. The novel also provides a fascinating glimpse into the behind-the-scenes work of the scientific community and the Hollywood war effort.

Overall, I highly recommend *The Nightingale Sings* to anyone who is looking for a well-written and engaging historical fiction novel with strong female characters.



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Jackie's family Silent auction



Holiday Punch screams holiday cheer. Perfect for Thanksgiving, Christmas, or New Years, this holiday punch is easy-to-throw-together in minutes. This is a sparkling beverage with the perfect balance of sweet and tart.

INGREDIENTS

• 4 cups cranberry classic juice (use chilled Ocean Spray or cranberry pomegranate juice)

- 2 cups sprite or lemon-lime soda, chilled
- 2 cups ginger, ale chilled
- 2 cups sparkling apple juice chilled
- 1 1/2 cups white rum or vodka (can omit)
- 1 1/2 cups frozen cranberries
- 1 orange or lemon, sliced
- 1 lime sliced
- 4 sprigs mint



- 1. Start with a good cranberry juice. Don't go for whole cranberry juice, pure cranberry juice, light or sugar free varieties. Cranberry juice is very sour as it is and you will need the added sweetness for a great punch.
- 2. Next, I use 7 Up which adds a touch of much needed sweetness.
- 3. You'll love the added ginger ale and sparkling apple juice. The idea here is to balance your drink!
- 4. Add in frozen cranberries which act like ice cubes, keeping your punch nice and chilled while providing added flavor benefits and won't get diluted or watered down!
- 5. Add mint leaves, lime slices, and orange slices. This will pack a great flavor punch.

MAKE PUNCH AHEAD OF TIME

Holiday punch is best served as soon as it has been mixed because the sparkling drinks will start to go flat. However, you can prepare the fruit slices and mint springs ahead of time. As soon as you are ready to assemble the liquids for your punch, it is easy to add the prepared fruit, mint and frozen cranberries.

October Meeting

Pam Craig grew up in Detroit, attended DPS, graduated from CMU (B.A.), and WSU (M.A.). She is a retired elementary teacher, an art lover, and a media specialist. She especially enjoys art, travel and movies. She graciously presented 'Frida Kahlo and Diego Rivera in Detroit' to Gamma Alpha members on October 19th at the Northville Library. We learned the history and context of the creation of the Diego Rivera Industry Murals at the Detroit Institute of Arts. During the 1930s, Edsel Ford invited these married artists to Detroit. Against the backdrop of the Great Depression and amid labor protests in the city, Rivera created his Detroit Industry murals which are the centerpiece for the Detroit Institute of Arts. Kahlo, meanwhile developed her own artistic identity almost unnoticed. It was a wellresearched and fascinating story about an explosive couple. He carried a pistol. She carried a flask. He romanticized Detroit. She rejected it. But what they shared was a belief in communism, a thirst for tequila, and a passion for each other. They left their mark on Detroit. 

Self-Regulation from *Curriculum for a Peaceful World* Vol. XXXVII, Issue 2, Summer 2023

In almost every classroom today you can find at least one student who has difficulty with self-regulation. Self-regulation refers to self-control and the ability to cope with difficult situations. The lack of self-regulation causes problems in the classroom. A child who has a tantrum, yells or even hits other children out of frustration probably won't be liked by their peers, and may face discipline at school. These students may not have the capacity to learn and fall behind, as well as have a negative impact on the other students in their classroom.

How do problems with self-regulation develop? They could start early, such as an infant being neglected. A child who does not feel safe and secure, or who is unsure whether their needs will be met, may have trouble self-soothing and self-regulating. Later, a child, teen, or adult may struggle with self-regulation, either because this ability was not developed during childhood, or because of a lack of strategies for managing difficult feelings such as frustration. Over time this could lead to even more serious issues such as mental health disorders and risky behaviors such as substance use. The ability of children to control their impulses is a key factor in long-term success.

How do we help children who are not able to self-regulate develop the ability to do so? The years between ages 6 and 12 are considered a key time for intervention and prevention, as this age group is considered to be the most responsive to self-control strategies. Most kids should have emotional regulation skills by the time they are 8 or 9. Research shows that spending just a few minutes a day working on these skills can make a difference.

Strategies for Classrooms

Predictable Routines and Expectations

Teach and practice routines - which will help build the ability to follow multistep directions.
