Underground Railroad Living Museum "Flight to Freedom" is a "storytelling" re-enactment, by members of the church about the original Underground Railroad passage that operated between 1840 and 1863. On the tour visitors will be shackled (with wrist bands) at

the entrance of the tour and begin their journey by entering through the "Door of No Return," on Goree Island in Africa. As this journey begins, visitors transform into passengers on the Underground Railroad and are led to freedom by a conductor. Passengers hide from bounty hunters, cross the Ohio "Deep" River, and take retreat in a safe house in Indiana which is owned by Abolitionist Levi Coffin. Finally, passengers move to "Midnight," the code name for Detroit and take safe haven at the First Congregational Church of Detroit before moving on to Canada and "Freedom." Lunch will follow the tour. Flyer is included.



What Are We Reading?

The Word is Murder

By Anthony Horowitz



The Word Is Murder is an intriguing detective novel that beautifully blends fiction and reality.

It's been two years since the British television show, *Injustice*, aired and police consultant Detective Daniel Hawthorne needs an infusion of cash. Hawthorne is a brilliant, but odd, detective who was fired from his job at the Metropolitan police. He decides to approach Anthony Horowitz a famous best-selling crime writer. Hawthorne has been asked by the Met to consult on a bizarre and complex murder. He wants Anthony to write a book about it, a bestselling book of

course, with a 50/50 split. Of course, Hawthorne will have to solve the case first!

But award winning writer Anthony Horowitz has never been busier in his life. He's working on a new season of *Foyle's War* and writing his first Sherlock Holmes novel. He has a life of his own and doesn't really want to be involved with a man he finds 'challenging' to say the least. And yet Horowitz finds himself fascinated by the case and the downright difficult detective with the brilliant, analytical mind. Would it be really such a crazy idea for Anthony to become the Watson to his Hawthorne's Holmes? The Captain Hastings to his Poirot? Should he stick to inventing his fictional murders? Or should he help investigate?

The case is very odd indeed. One bright spring morning in London, Diana Cowper, the wealthy mother of a famous actor, enters a funeral parlor. She is there to plan her own funeral service. Six hours later she is found dead, strangled with a curtain cord in her own home.

Drawn into the case against his will, Horowitz soon finds himself in the center of a story he cannot control. Hawthorne is brusque, temperamental, and annoying. But this case with its many twists and turns proves irresistible. The writer and the detective form an unusual partnership. At the same time, it soon becomes clear that Hawthorne is hiding some dark secrets of his own.

The Word Is Murder is written in first person, and the narrator is Horowitz himself. He stays true to the facts about himself, detailing his work as a creator on the show Foyle's War and his successful Alex Rider children's book series. Horowitz takes the first person to the next level, explaining throughout the narration how he decided what details from this "real life" investigation to include and exclude in the novel while discussing how certain aspects of writing this story gave him difficulty like starting the writing process before even knowing if the detective, Hawthorne, would ever be able to solve the case. This adds another mystery to the novel: How much of what is written is real and how much is fake? The facts of Horowitz's life are true, but the famous actor whose mother is murdered in the first chapter of the novel, is fictional. Yet again, Horowitz has stuffed one mystery inside another.

Horowitz has complicated the typical mystery and created something that is difficult to explain but easy to follow.

Tuscan Chicken Recipe

INGREDIENTS



1 small yellow onion

3 cloves garlic

1/2 cup drained oil-packed sun-dried tomatoes 1 ounce

1/2 cup firmly packed freshly grated or 1/3 cup store-bought grated

2 large boneless, skinless chicken breasts (1 1/2 to 2 pounds total)

1 1/2 teaspoons kosher salt, divided

1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

2 to 3 tablespoons olive oil, divided

2 teaspoons dried Italian seasoning

5 ounces baby spinach (about 5 packed cups)

1 cup heavy cream

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Dice 1 small yellow onion (about 2/3 cup). Mince 3 garlic cloves. Thinly slice 1/2 cup drained oil-packed sun-dried tomatoes. Finely grate 1 ounce Parmesan cheese (about 1/2 cup lightly packed) or measure out 1/3 cup store-bought grated.
- 2. Cut chicken breasts into strips. Pat dry. Season all over with 1 teaspoon of the kosher salt and 1/2 teaspoon black pepper.
- 3. Heat 1 tablespoon of the olive oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat until shimmering. Add half of the chicken in a single layer and sear until browned, 3 to 5 minutes per side. Transfer to a large plate (the chicken will not be cooked through). Add 1 tablespoon of the olive oil to the pan and repeat browning the remaining chicken. Transfer to the same plate.
- 4. Reduce the heat to medium. Add the remaining 1 tablespoon olive oil, if needed, and heat until shimmering. Add the onion and cook, stirring occasionally until softened, 2 to 3 minutes. Add the garlic, sun-dried tomatoes, and 2 teaspoons dried Italian seasoning. Cook until fragrant, 30 seconds to 1 minute. Add 5 ounces baby spinach a handful at a time. Cook, stirring regularly, until just wilted, 1 to 2 minutes.
- 5. Add the Parmesan, the cup of heavy cream, and the remaining 1/2 teaspoon kosher salt. Bring to a simmer, scraping up any browned bits from the bottom of the pan with a wooden spoon.
- 6. Reduce the heat to maintain a gentle simmer. Return the chicken and any accumulated juices on the plate to the pan and cook until the chicken is cooked through and registers at least 165°F on an instant-read thermometer, about 4 to 7 minutes.

I recently made this and my diners said it was deliziosa.



Detroit Metro Coordinating Council and The Underground Railroad 'Flight to Freedom Experience'

In 2001, the congregation of the Historic First Congregational Church of Detroit had a vision with a mission to capture and sustain the national legacy of the Underground Railroad for researchers, educators, non-profit organizations and their constituencies. From this vision and mission the Underground Railroad Living Museum was born. The Underground Railroad Living Museum: Flight to Freedom Tour is a ninety-minute "storytelling" re-enactment by members of the Historic First Congregational Church of the original Underground Railroad passage that operated between 1840 and 1863. On the tour visitors will be 'shackled' with wrist bands at the entrance of the tour and begin their journey by

entering through the "Door of No Return," on Goree Island in Africa. As this journey begins, visitors transform into passengers on the Underground Railroad and are led to Freedom by a 'conductor.' Passengers hide from bounty hunters, cross the Ohio "Deep" river, take retreat in a safe house in Indiana which is owned by Abolitionist Levi Coffin. Finally passengers move to "Midnight," the code name for Detroit, and take safe haven at the First Congregational Church of Detroit before moving on to Canada and "Freedom." The tour is only for 34 participants. The first 34 who send their checks to the Metro Council Treasurer will be included in the tour. Please provide your own transportation to the church. We suggest you arrange to car pool there. Use your GPS for directions. The tour is handicap accessible. Lunch is included.

Brain Health

Regular physical exercise may be a beneficial strategy to lower the risk of Alzheimer's and vascular dementia. Exercise may directly benefit brain cells by increasing blood and oxygen flow in the brain. Because of its known cardiovascular benefits, an approved exercise program is a valuable part of any overall wellness plan.

Current evidence suggests that heart-healthy eating may also help protect the brain. Heart-healthy eating includes: limiting the intake of sugar and saturated fats, as well as making sure to eat plenty of fruits, vegetables, and whole grains. No one diet is best. Two diets that have been studied and may be beneficial to lowering the risk of Alzheimer's are the DASH (Dietary Approaches to Stop Hypertension) diet and the Mediterranean diet.

- The DASH diet emphasizes vegetables, fruits, fatfree or low-fat dairy products, whole grains, fish, poultry, beans, seeds, nuts, and vegetable oils. The DASH diet limits sodium, sweets, sugary beverages, and red meats.
- A Mediterranean diet includes relatively little red meat. It emphasizes whole grains, fruits/ vegetables, fish/shellfish, and healthy fats like nuts and olive oil.

Social connections and intellectual activity

A number of studies indicate that maintaining strong social connections and keeping mentally active as we age might lower the risk of cognitive decline. A team from the University of Geneva has discovered that practicing and listening to music can alter cognitive decline in healthy seniors by stimulating the production of grey matter.

Head trauma

There appears to be a strong link between future risk of cognitive decline and serious head trauma, especially when injury involves loss of consciousness. You can help reduce your risk of Alzheimer's and protect your head by:

- Wearing a seat belt.
- Using a helmet when participating in sports.
- "Fall-proofing" your home by minimizing clutter, loose rugs and poor lighting.

What you can do now

While research is not yet conclusive - partially due to the need for more large-scale studies in diverse populations - certain lifestyle choices, such as physical activity and diet, may help support brain health and prevent Alzheimer's. Many of these lifestyle changes have been shown to lower the risk of other diseases, like heart disease and diabetes, which have been linked to Alzheimer's. Healthy lifestyle choices can improve your health and possibly protect your brain.
