Education a Key to Improving Economy

Gov. Jennifer Granholm received warm greetings when she made a surprise visit to the MEA-Retired annual meeting in Lansing on April 19. She stated that raising high school graduation requirements will help improve Michigan's economy. "Today's students no longer compete with just the students sitting in the next desk or students in the next state," the governor told the gathering of nearly 200 retired teachers and support staff. "In today's global economy, they compete with students from countries around the world, and need the best education possible."

Granholm signed the legislation raising graduation requirements and stated education is a key component to raising economic standards in Michigan. "We want to double the number of college graduates in Michigan over the next ten years," she said. "The states that have the lowest unemployment rates have the best educated workforces."

Education also is the key to diversifying the Michigan economy, Granholm said. "Our economic table has been balanced largely on one leg—the auto industry. We need to add some legs to diversify our economy for stability."

Raising graduation requirements and increasing the number of college graduates will help Michigan compete in the global economy and fill the jobs of the 21st century, she said. The Michigan Merit Core of academic courses in the State Board's plan include:

- *four years of English Language Arts;*
- *one year each of Algebra I, Geometry, Algebra II, and an additional math class in the senior year;*
- *one year each of Biology; Physics or Chemistry; and one additional year of science;*
- *three years of Social Science, which must include a semester of Civics and a semester of Economics;*
- *two years of world languages;*
- *one year of Health/Physical Education and one year of Visual and Performing arts.*
- *Take the Michigan Merit exam, (or the alternate MI-ACCESS assessment for students with severe disabilities);*
- *Complete at least one on-line credit or non-credit course*

The Broker

By John Grisham

Most of Grisham's writing involves lawyers and the legal profession, but Grisham occasionally veers away from that theme and readers find themselves experiencing a book far different from what most would identify as the standard Grisham thriller.

The Broker begins with a surprise pardon from a lame duck president. Joel Backman, a Washington power-broker, has served six years of a 20-year sentence for espionage and treason. As part of the pardon agree-

ment, the CIA rush Backman out of the country on a military cargo plane and he is given a new identity in Bologna where he should be enjoying a life of quiet serenity as "Marco Lazzeri." One of the reasons I enjoyed this book is because the main character needed to immerse himself Italian in order to survive. I have been trying to learn Italian and would not make it if I was in his place. But Backman, who was once known as the second most powerful man in Washington, has made serious enemies around the world, and they're all gunning for "the broker." As the CIA watches him closely, the question is not whether he will be killed, but rather *who* will try to kill him first.

For me, reading John Grisham is like eating comfort food. Each year fill my plate with a newly published novel and savor the plot and characters. *The Broker* is a little different. The traditional meatloaf is served Italian style, but the comfort is still there.
