Kitchen Talk

Layered Taco Dip

Ingredients:

- 1 pound lean ground beef
- 1 can (4 ounces) chopped green chilies, undrained
- 2 teaspoons beef flavored instant bouillon
- 1 can (15 ounces) refried beans
- 16 ounces sour cream
- 1 packet (1.7 ounces) taco seasonings mix
- Guacamole (purchased or homemade)
- Garnishes: shredded cheddar cheese, chopped tomatoes, sliced green onions, sliced ripe olives, chopped jalapenos
- Tortilla chips
- Salsa

Procedure:

Brown the beef, pour off the fat. Add chilies and bouillon, cook and stir until the bouillon dissolves. Cool. Stir in the beans. In a small bowl, combine sour cream and taco seasoning. Set aside. Spread beef and beef mixture on a large plate. Top with the sour cream mixture and guacamole. Cover. Chill for several hours. Just before serving add the garnishes. Serve with tortilla chips and salsa.

Book Talk

“American Wife”

by Curtis Sittenfeld

American Wife, by Curtis Sittenfeld, is a remarkable novel. The author took four actual events from Laura Bush’s life and wove them into the fictional story of Alice Lindgren and how she became the wife of a president. The characterizations are amazing and engaging.

Charlie Blackwell is a fun-loving, Midwestern version of George Bush with his known charisma, self-absorbed innocence, wealthy, powerful staunch Republican family and personal shortcomings. The clash of politics and privilege are a challenge for the quiet, bookish, sincere small town librarian as she navigates her way through the minefield of public life. Alice faces the contradictions of loving her husband and disagreeing with some of his beliefs. The complexities of marriage are laid bare.

The author’s own liberal Democratic leanings shine through her reluctant heroine as we follow a life lived “almost in opposition to itself”. For any woman born in the 40’s, you will experience a beautifully written walk down memory lane. How young Curtis Sittenfeld recreated this time is a testament to her talent. The author is an admirer of Laura Bush.

This is an excellent book club choice, as it opens many areas for discussion and creates more questions than answers. Enjoy the read!

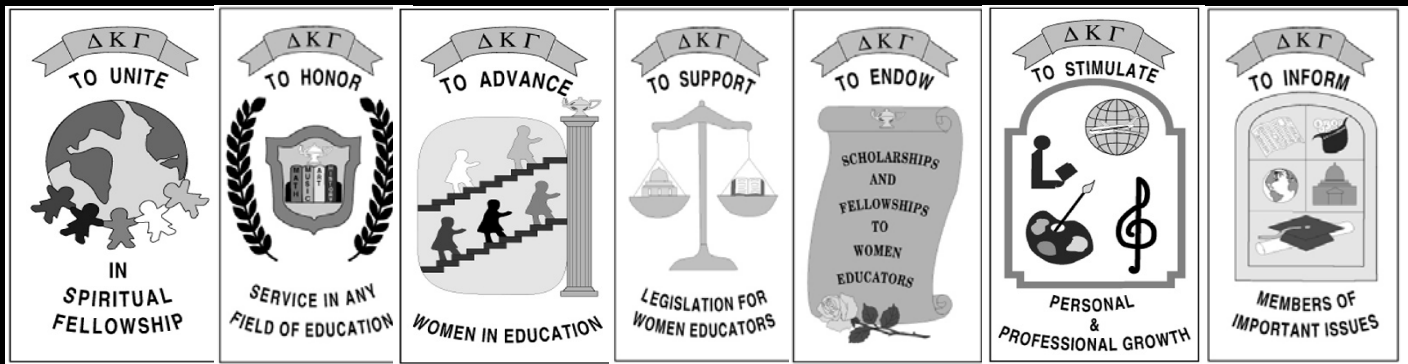
Everybody worked! Jackie helped to sell raffle tickets and scholarship pins during lunch.

Research

One of the Seven Purposes of Delta Kappa Gamma is to **Inform** members of important issues and research. So...

Inform: Despite rumors to the contrary, there does not appear to be any difference between the way male and female brains process words in reading. Using over 200 subjects and MRI scans, Researchers found no difference in the involvement or asymmetry of either Broca's or Wernicke's areas. Chiarello, C. et al. (2009). *Neuropsychology*. Vol 23(2), Mar 2009, 210-222.

Inform: Research suggests that after-school programs can make a difference in academic performance and socio-emotional development, but the record is far from consistent and two rigorous studies of the largest federal programs found limited or no impacts on student outcomes. The logical next step is a systematic effort to improve the quality of federally funded after-school programs. Black, A.R., and et..al, 2008.

The Evaluation of Enhanced Academic Instruction in After-School Programs: Findings After the First Year of Implementation.
