#### Your Face is the Mirror of Everything! (6:30 - 7:30 p.m.)

Are you able to gauge sincerity during a discussion? How do you know if someone is really smiling, or only flashing a fake smile? Many of the non-verbal cues we receive from others come from facial expressions, especially from the eyes. Things like our rate of blinking, eye contact, dilated pupils and facial muscle contractions combined with other cues often tell much more than we intend them to. An educator's job involves interactions with students where superior communications, both verbal and nonverbal, produces better learning. #### Kids 4 Afghan Kids (6:30 - 7:30 p.m.)

Teaching students about diversity and the world around them can be a difficult task for educators. Northville teacher, Khris Nedam, and her sixth grade students took a unique approach in learning about Afghanistan. Her students discovered that the country had suffered a long drought, economic disruption due to the Soviet Union

invasion, the Taliban rule, and the recent war. Students learned that children in many rural parts of Afghanistan had not had a school or access to a doctor in over 20 years. After understanding the hardships of Afghan children, Mrs. Nedam's students decided to be proactive and Kids 4 Afghan Kids was born. Under the guidance of their teacher, the students raised money and witnessed, via videotapes, internet and cell phones, the construction of a six-room school, a medical clinic, an orphanage, a bakery/kitchen, a guest house and community well for the residents of Wonkhai Valley, a mountainous area 3 hours southwest of Kabul. ### **Guinness Beef Stew**

The weather is getting cooler and crock pot comfort food calls. Try this recipe I brought back from England.

Make sure to buy large chunks of stew meat. Trim meat of excess fat, as necessary, and cut into 11/2-inch pieces. Be gentle when stirring in the flour in step 3-the fork-tender beef will fall apart if stirred too aggressively.

#### Serves 6 to 8

- 4 pounds boneless beef chuck
- Table salt and ground black pepper
- 2 Tablespoons vegetable oil
- 2 onions, chopped
- 4 cups low sodium chicken broth
- I 1/2 cups Guinness Draught
- I Tablespoon light brown sugar
- I teaspoon dried thyme
- I ounce bittersweet chocolate, chopped
- 2 bay leaves
- 5 carrots, peeled and cut into I inch chunks
- I pound parsnips, peeled and cut into I inch chunks
- I pound baby reds potatoes, scrubbed
- 1/2 cup all purpose flour
- 2 Tablespoons minced fresh parsley

1. Pat beef dry with paper towels and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Heat 2 teaspoons oil in large skillet over medium-high heat until just smoking. Cook half of beef until browned on all sides, about 8 minutes. Transfer to slow cooker insert and repeat with additional 2 teaspoons oil and remaining beef.

2. Add remaining 2 teaspoons oil, onions, and 1/4 teaspoon salt to skillet and cook until onions are lightly browned, about 5 minutes. Add broth, 1 1/4 cups stout, sugar, thyme, chocolate, and bay leaves and bring to boil, using wooden spoon to scrape up browned bits. Transfer to slow cooker insert.

3. Add carrots, parsnips, and potatoes to slow cooker insert. Cover and cook on low until meat is tender, 9 to 10 hours (or cook on high for 6 to 7 hours). Set slow cooker to high. Whisk flour and remaining 1/4 cup beer until smooth, then stir mixture into slow cooker. Cook, covered, until sauce thickens, about 15 minutes. Stir in parsley, season with salt and pepper, and discard bay leaf. Serve.

#### Make Ahead:

You can prepare the recipe through step 2 the night before the ingredients go into the slow cooker. Refrigerate the browned beef and the onion mixture in separate containers.

In the morning, transfer the beef and the onion mixture to the slow cooker and proceed with step 3.



# Know the Difference Between Cold and HINI Flu Symptoms

<u>Symptom</u>	Cold	HINI Flu
Fever	Fever is rare with a cold.	Fever is usually present with the flu in up to 80% of all flu cases. A temperature of 100°F or higher for 3 to 4 days is associated with the flu.
Coughing	A hacking, productive (mucus- producing) cough is often present with a cold.	A non-productive (non-mucus producing) cough is usually present with the flu (sometimes referred to as dry cough).
Aches	Slight body aches and pains can be part of a cold.	Severe aches and pains are common with the flu.
Stuffy Nose	Stuffy nose is commonly present with a cold and typically resolves spontaneously within a week.	Stuffy nose is not commonly present with the flu.
Chills	Chills are uncommon with a cold.	60% of people who have the flu experience chills.
Tiredness	Tiredness is fairly mild with a cold.	Tiredness is moderate to severe with the flu.
Sneezing	Sneezing is commonly present with a cold.	Sneezing is not common with the flu.
Sudden Symptoms	Cold symptoms tend to develop over a few days.	The flu has a rapid onset within 3-6 hours. The flu hits hard and includes sudden symptoms like high fever, aches and pains.
Headache	A headache is fairly uncommon with a cold.	A headache is very common with the flu, present in 80% of flu cases.
Sore Throat	Sore throat is commonly present with a cold.	Sore throat is not commonly present with the flu.
Chest Discomfort	Chest discomfort is mild to moderate with a cold.	Chest discomfort is often severe with the flu.

#### **Issues in Brief**

- Cuts of \$165 per pupil could grow to \$200+ by next year. Districts will lose millions; talk of closing schools or higher class sizes or consolidation has been on TV talk shows, too.
- "Neighborhood Schools" new word for Charter Schools and still no Teacher Certification required for them.
- Movement continues to do away with unions could happen if union school consolidates with non-union school or bus drivers, parapro/ESPs, etc. Dewitt District dismissed custodians, gave them 6 hours to clear out of the building. A lawsuit was filed.

• Dillon Health Plan (This bill is online)

This bill would impact active and retired teachers and all state employees. MPSERS Board needs to be watched. It is appointed by governor and some think they are a rubber stamp. This bill eliminates collective bargaining because a school district can use this as tool to increase/decrease wages, class size, and could lead to eliminate MESSA (our health group for the entire state of Michigan). Over the years this has long been feared, and in this depressed time it rears its ugly head again.


#### **Retirees & Health Insurance Changes**


