## THE DKG EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION



The Delta Kappa Gamma  
Educational Foundation

Created in 1964 as a non-profit corporation, the Educational Foundation encourages the continuation of innovative and creative educational opportunities. The Foundation spends more than \$150,000 each year to support creative projects, seminars, and professional development. Projects funded for 2011 are taking place in 25 US states, three Canadian Provinces, Afghanistan, Kenya, Egypt, El Salvador, Ethiopia, Gambia, Honduras, Mexico, Sweden, Tanzania and Uganda.

These Projects include purchasing educational materials from books and playground equipment to a mobile library cart. Other projects funded are for an after-school science program, a museum inventory, help for children facing adversity, a writing project for student and may other worthwhile activities.

Projects must meet one or more of the following:

- Support and encourage intercultural understanding.
- Encourage standards of excellence in education.
- Assist and cooperate with schools, colleges, universities and other persons, organizations, trust funds or foundations in support, encouragement, and improvement of education.

On April 30, 2011 the Educational Foundation Board of Trustees approved a project for Seedlings, Braille Books for Blind Children. Gamma Alpha wrote a grant for Seedlings and was awarded \$2,500 for the Rose Project. The Rose Project will provide blind children with free research materials for school projects in Braille.

Project Application Packets are available on the Web site from July 1 to January 3. The next dead-line for Project Applications is January 3, 2012.


### EXERCISE YOUR VOICE

With all that is happening legislatively that affects practically everything we do and particularly our educational systems, exercising our voice to our legislators has never been more important.

The following is a ranking of most to least effective means when contacting local or international government officials:

1. Personal visit
2. Handwritten short letter
3. Type written letter
4. Phone call to a key office staffer
5. Phone call to the reception staffers in the office

6. Personally written fax
7. Obvious form letter or fax
8. Personally written email
9. Obvious form email



## Confronting the Bullies

Most school employees are now well aware of the epidemic of bullying and harassment that continues to plague our nation's public schools. Last year, at least six teenagers committed suicide as the direct result of being bullied at school. It's called "bullycide" and it has to stop. It is a moral and legal imperative. What every NEA member needs to know is that you can be sued personally for money damages if you witness instances of bullying and various types of harassment (based on race, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, or disability) and fail to take action to address it or report it. While school districts have traditionally been the targets of these lawsuits, school employees, in increasing numbers, are also being named as defendants.

### What should a school employee do to help fight this national crisis and avoid being sued?

- **Make sure** your school district has a strong anti-bullying and harassment policy in place.
- **Insist that** your school district educate students about peer harassment.
- **Ask your** school district to provide in-service training for teachers about how to spot bullying, how to respond, and to whom to report it,
- **Even if** the student doesn't want you to report the incident(s) to the administration, you still have a legal obligation to do so. And always put it in writing and keep a copy.
- **If you** witness a bullying incident, intervene immediately. Tell the harasser that his or her behavior is not acceptable.
- **Finally,** model good behavior. Remember, you are a role model to your students.

The Department of Education (ED) has taken a strong stand against bullying and harassment in schools. Last October, ED sent a comprehensive "Dear Colleague" letter to schools explaining their legal obligation under federal law to protect students from student-on-student harassment. The guidance provides examples and describes how schools should respond. NEA has also launched a new campaign: "Bully Free: It Starts with Me" which encourages members to be a caring adult who acts on behalf of bullied students.


## Attract New Members



The project that DKG has adopted is **Schools for Africa**. This is a joint campaign founded by UNICEF, the Nelson Mandela Foundation, and the Hamburg Society to

promote education for children in Africa. The campaign will increase access to quality basic education for children with a special focus on girls, orphans and vulnerable children. UNICEF is working with governments, local authorities, communities and other partners to:

- Build and rehabilitate 1,000 schools;
- Create schools that offer a safe and protective environment where children can learn and play;
- Provide access to clean water and separate sanitation facilities for boys and girls in those schools;
- Supply exercise books, pens, proper furniture and other school and sports materials;
- Train 100,000 teachers to provide children with quality education and basic life skills; and
- Educate children about proper hygiene and HIV prevention; this knowledge is passed on to siblings, parents, and the community at large.
