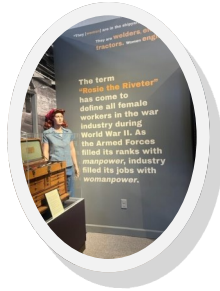

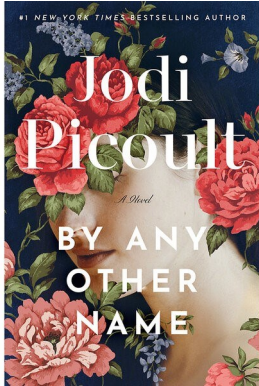

What Are We Reading?

By Any Other Name

By Jodi Picoult



By Any Other Name by Jodi Picoult is a historical fiction novel about two women who are forced to hide their identities to be heard. The story is told in dual timelines, one set in Elizabethan England and the other in modern day New York.

I love the ‘mash-up’ of history and fiction. *By Any Other Name* was written for anyone who likes this genre. So here’s the story. In 1581, young Emilia Bassano was the ward of English aristocrats. She was a gifted musician. She had traveled to France, Italy, and Denmark with them. She was an outstanding student. Her lessons in languages, history, and writing endowed her with a sharp wit and a gift for storytelling. Like all women living in the male-dominated world in which she lived, she wasn’t allowed a voice of her own. Women could not be poets or writers. Her circumstances change, and she is forced to become the mistress of the Lord Chamberlain. He was a kind old man whose job was to oversee all theater productions in England. Because he saw how clever Emilia was, he allowed her to help edit some of the plays he received. She saw firsthand how the words of playwrights could move an audience to laughter or tears. She begins to form a plan to secretly bring her writing to the stage by paying an actor to front her work. The actor is William Shakespeare.

Shift to the present. Melina Green is a struggling young playwright in New York City. She has just written a new play inspired by the life of her Elizabethan ancestor, Emilia Bassano. She knew she would never see her play performed. The theater world is still not a level playing field for women playwrights. She is afraid to risk rejection again. Secretly her roommate takes the decision out of her hands and submits her play under a male pseudonym and it is selected to be produced.

The story is told in intertwining timelines. Both women are playwrights, both must confront the theater world that diminishes the work of women, despite the centuries between them. Should a writer do whatever it takes to see her story live on...no matter the costs? This is a story of ambition, courage, and desire of two women who created something beautiful, despite the prejudices they had to face. I found it an enjoyable read.

Nation Gets a New Report Card Nearly 5 Years after Schools Closed

Co-President, Pam Emerson recently read an interesting report by NPR on our nation's schools. This is a condensed version. The link for the entire article is at the end.

Almost five years have passed since COVID-19 first disrupted America's schools, and new data, known as the Nation's Report Card, offers cause for hope — and concern.

The good news: In math, many students have made up at least some of the academic ground they lost during the pandemic. The bad news: In both reading and math, most fourth- and eighth-graders in 2024 still performed *below* pre-pandemic 2019 levels.

This article discusses the 2024 Nation's Report Card (NAEP) results, focusing on math and reading scores for fourth and eighth graders. Here's a breakdown of the key findings:

Math:

- **Hopeful Signs:** Fourth-grade math scores showed slight improvement compared to 2022, suggesting some recovery from pandemic learning loss. White, Black, Hispanic, and economically disadvantaged students all saw modest gains. Eighth-grade scores held steady.
- **Still Below Pre-Pandemic Levels:** Despite the improvement, both fourth and eighth-grade math scores remain below 2019 levels. The gains made are not enough to fully close the gap.
- **Pre-Existing Trends:** The decline in math scores began *before* the pandemic, around 2013, raising questions about underlying causes. Possible explanations include changes in education policy (like the phasing out of No Child Left Behind), the Great Recession, increased screen time, and a decline in reading for pleasure.
- **Widening Gap:** A concerning trend is the widening achievement gap in eighth-grade math. High-performing students improved, while low-performing students lost further ground.
- **Proficiency Levels:** Overall, 39% of fourth-graders and 28% of eighth-graders are at or above NAEP's proficiency standard in math.

Reading:

- **Concerning Results:** Reading scores paint a less optimistic picture. Fourth-grade reading scores continued to decline, falling below both 2022 and 2019 levels. Eighth-grade scores also dropped.
- **Pre-Existing Trends:** As with math, reading scores were already declining before the pandemic, starting around 2015.
- **Low Proficiency:** Only 31% of fourth-graders and 30% of eighth-graders are at or above the proficiency standard in reading.
- **Historical Lows:** The share of eighth-graders reading below the "basic" level is the highest in NAEP history. The lowest-performing readers are scoring lower than they did 30 years ago.
- **No State Improvement:** No state saw improved eighth-grade reading scores

compared to either 2022 or 2019.

Other Key Findings:

- **Socioeconomic Disparities:** The NAEP results highlight the strong correlation between socioeconomic status (SES) and academic performance. Students from wealthier backgrounds significantly outperformed those from lower-income backgrounds.
- **Attendance Matters:** Lower-performing students are more likely to report missing school. Chronic absenteeism is a significant problem that hinders learning.

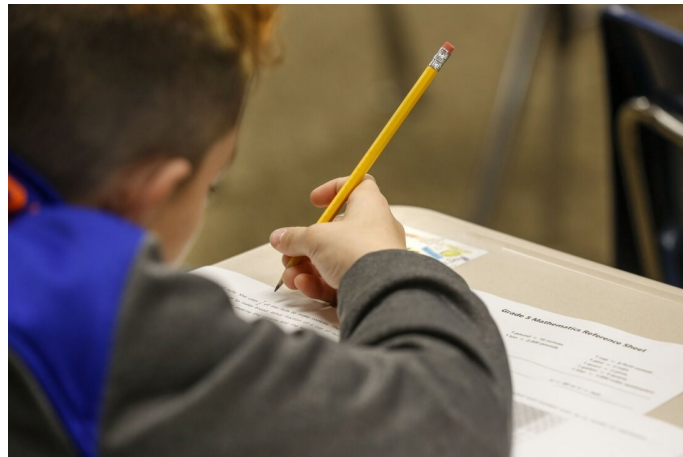
Overall:

The Nation's Report Card presents a mixed picture. While there's some hope in math recovery for fourth-graders, reading scores continue to decline, and achievement gaps are widening. The data underscores the need to address pre-existing trends that were exacerbated by the pandemic, as well as the importance of tackling issues like chronic absenteeism and socioeconomic disparities. The article emphasizes that simply throwing money at the problem isn't enough; a deeper understanding of the underlying causes is crucial for effective solutions.
